### *Meet the Coach.....*



STEVE OWEN

Argonaut, Head Coach

STEVE OWEN, Head Coach. Thirty-four years ago Steve Owen, the boy tackle of the Kansas City Cowboys, played a game against the New York Giants. The Cowboys and Owen the boy had a pretty good day against the Giants so it was natural that Owen should be asked to join the New York Club.

Steve accepted the offer to play two post season games not for the money but because they were to be played in Florida. Steve had never been to Florida.

The following season, 1926, Owen joined the Giants at the Polo Grounds and stayed on for 27 years.

Owen owns one of football's longest and most illustrious coaching records. As a player he captained the club which, in 1927, allowed 10 opponents a total of 20 points, an NFL record that has never been broken.

Steve, his brother Bill and Les Grant played all the tackle for the Giants for five years.

In 1930 the coaching profession opened its golden gates to Owen when Leroy B. Andrews, Giants' coach, had a rift with the management and went home mad. Steve carried on as a playing coach until 1933 when he assumed the coaching job on a full time basis. His brother Bill coached the line for him for 10 years before he, as Steve puts it, "got smart and left the racket."

During his tenure with Giants Owen coached the club to nine sectional championships and became football's most storied leader. In his first 12 years as a Giant coach he had the club in the playoffs nine times.

Steve left the Giants in 1953 and laid off the following year. In the 1955 season he was at Baylor U and in 1956 he went to the Philadelphia Eagles as defensive coach.

Owen was relieved from football last season when he received a call from Hump Pool, then Argo coach, to come to Toronto to act as defensive coach. Starting like a scared cavalry horse, Owen came to football on the dead run.

When trouble continued to dog the Argo's this season and Pool was released, Owen was management's choice as the man who could do the most to restore prosperity.

His wealth of experience and his ability to mine the last ounce of talent out of a player have been Owen's keys to success. Assuming the hot seat so recently vacated by Pool, Owen reacted at the consequences, announcing that he had been in tough spots before.

Having had no time for hobbies, Steve spends his spare time chewing tobacco and telling stories. He and wife Mician live in Oneida, New York in the off season.

GEORGE STOCKWELL: Celebrating his 31st season with the Argonauts, Stockwell is the man behind the scenes. As office and ticket manager he faced and solved the problems contingent upon Argos' move to the C.N.E. Stadium. Up until 1954 George acted in the dual capacity of trainer and office manager, moving on that year to a full time job in the front office. Started training immediately after discharge following the First World War. He broke in with the Midland lacrosse and hockey teams. Came to the Argos in 1928 and has seen them come and go since.

Married, with five children, George enjoys weekends when he can tramp the horizon with his beagle. Also enjoys a spot of fishing.



TED MORRIS: Ted has run the gamut of success in football as a player, coach, talent hunter, other dinner speaker and organizer. In charge of the development of Canadian players, Ted operates the Argo rookie camp every season. He has been highly instrumental in the organization of junior football clubs in the area.

Morris rejoined the Argos in 1956 after retiring in 1950. As a player he was on the 1933, 1937, 1938 winners. He ended his playing career in 1939 and turned to coaching. Was assistant under Lew Hayman in 1941 and 1942, coached the Navy team in 1942, 1943 and 1944, winning a championship in the latter year. In 1945 he returned to the Argos to build one of Canadian football's all time great teams, winning the Grey Cup in that year in 1946 and in 1947.

A successful former near Maitland, Tedder now splits his time between the tractor, the football fields where he farms out the promising young ball players, and the rubber stock circuit where he has a reputation for speaking forcefully and frankly about his favorite subject . . . the Argonauts.



GORD ROWAN, Stadium Co-ordinator. An architect by trade, Rowan's interest in football and football records dates back to the days of Conacher, Batstone, Munro and Fear. He was a logical choice when the necessity arose to appoint a person who could oversee the field operation at the new C.N.E. Stadium. Among his duties are checking field markings, playing surface, benches, timer's tables, accommodation for visiting teams and officials, bands and Shelleettes, and the hundreds of other details that ensure a smooth operation.



**ART SARGEANT**, Head Trainer. A native of Southampton where he saw his first roll of tape 42 years ago, Arthur is now in his second season with the Argonauts as head trainer which is quite natural in view of the fact he's a mechanist by trade. Sarge was so enamoured of athletics in general and football in particular that he left his former profession to become a trainer with Balmy Beach of the OFFU eight years ago. An athlete of sorts himself as a youth, Sarge excelled in the 100 and 200 yard dashes and was a proficient County soccer player in the Old Country. He served with the R.A.F. during the war as a wireless operator and gunner and won an opie for a year and a half. Arthur, who rules his down-stairs dressing room domain with an iron fist, is assisted in his duties by Roy Fink.

**BOB HESKETH**, Publicity and Promotion Director, joined the Argos last season. A native of Toronto, he attended Malvern Collegiate where he did absolutely nothing to distinguish himself. Served with the RCAF but the Allies won anyway.

He joined the sports staff at the Telegram in 1947 after a brief stint covering courts and Osgoode Hall. Covered a miscellany of events, left the paper in 1957 to enter the field of public relations with Stanfield, Johnson and Hill.

Married, with two children, he spends his weekends either watching football games or cutting lawns.



(N) ROSS COYLE, Age 22, Wt. 190, Ht. 6'2"

Oklahoma University. Home town, Minnow, Oklahoma. Has good speed and can catch passes. Competent defensive player Coyle gained recognition with Canadian fans via television when he caught a pass and ran 79 yards for the Sooners against Syracuse U. in the 1959 Orange bowl game. In a regular season game a pass from Brewster Hobby set him off on 74 yard touchdown play. Single, he majored in zoological science. Likes golf and hunting.

**JOHN A. PALMER, M.D., F.R.C.S. (C)**: Dr. Palmer has been the Argonaut team surgeon for the past two seasons. A graduate of University of Toronto, 1948, he spent seven years in post graduate work in Toronto and Britain following which he was appointed to the medical staff of the Toronto General Hospital, consultant staff of the Princess Margaret Hospital and the teaching staff of the University of Toronto. He is a fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada.

(C) MORGAN CLARK, Age 23, Wt. 230, Ht. 6'0"

Came to Argos late this season from B.C. Lions. Western University. Started in Windsor high school ranks and with the A.K.P. Juniors before playing with Western University Mustangs. Named to the Inter-collegiate All-Star team in 1957, but was ineligible academically in 1958. Played in '58 with Sarnia Seals and purchased by Lions in a five player deal. Single.

(C) PAUL FEDOR, Age 25, Wt. 203, Ht. 6'2"

Queen's University. From Niagara Falls. Another serious blow to the Argo end corps was suffered when Fedor received a broken leg in pre-season training. Number one draft choice last year, Fedor made the grade quickly as a defensive end. This season coach Pool planned to use him as a pass receiver after he caught eight for 98 yards in his rookie year. Single, he is seeking a career in the building business.

(C) ED OCHIENA, Age 21, Wt. 184, Ht. 6'2"

Home Toronto. Ochienna came to the Argonauts through the system. After playing for Lawrence Park Collegiate he went to North York Jr. Knights and through the Argos rookie camp. Turned in creditable performances at Flanker and showed signs of being one of the better prospects. Single, he likes basketball, swimming, track and golf.



(N) RON STOVER, Age 22, Wt. 205, Ht. 6'3"

University of Oregon, from Vallejo, California. Highly regarded as an offensive end. Stover's greatest success came in the Rose Bowl game when he caught 10 passes against Ohio State to establish an all time Bowl record. Played in the East-West Shrine game and the All American Bowl at Tucson. In the regular season, preceding his Rose Bowl accomplishment, he caught 24 passes. Captain of the Webfoots in his senior year. Plays defense well but will fit better into the offensive passing pattern engineered by Sam Knox.



(III) PETE O'GARRO, Age 26, Wt. 210, Ht. 6'3"

From U.C.L.A. Home town, Santa Barbara, California. Now in his third year with the club O'Garro hasn't had a season that hasn't been marred by injuries. An operation on a trick knee caused him to miss most of the '58 season. This year, in the opening game against the Rough Riders in Ottawa he suffered a broken leg that will keep him out all season. Served two years with the army at Ford Ord following graduation. Exceptionally fine long pass receiver with deceptive speed. Was picked by the NY Giants as eighth choice in 1954. Single. Hobby is playing bridge. Seeks a career in business.



(C) AL SCHLOSSER, Age 21, Wt. 200, Ht. 6'3"

From Hamilton. Played with East York Intermediates last season after Argos sent him out for more seasoning. Plays offense and defense. A graduate of Ted Morris' Canadian rookie camp. Schlosser attended Cathedral and Westdale High Schools in Hamilton. A fine basketball player, he once scored 72 points in a single game. Single.



(C) PETE BENNETT, Age 32, Wt. 245, Ht. 6'3"

From the University of Toronto, his home town is Toronto. The grandpappy of them all, Pete shows no signs of wear and tear going into his 11th season with the Argonauts. He has played on two Grey Cup teams, he has been a defensive end and has played guard and tackle both ways. Being used mostly on defense this season. Played for Malvern CI in Toronto before college. Pete is a chartered accountant, he enjoys golf and basketball. Married. Hobby: four kids.



(C) JOHN CASEY, Age 24, Wt. 210, Ht. 6'1"

(C) BOB DAY, Age 22, Wt. 218, Ht. 6'1 1/2"

Came up through the system with Parkdale Juniors (Canadian champs) and went to East York Intermediates for seasoning last year. Offensive tackle and defensive end, he will see most action in the latter position, may help solve shortage of Canadians there. Good pass rusher, he makes smart moves. Married, likes hockey and baseball.



(NI) CHARLIE HORTON, Age 22, Wt. 232, Ht. 6'2"

From Baylor. Home town Waco, Texas. Drafted second by the Detroit Lions. Horton chose Canadian ball instead. His scouting report reads "aggressive, hard hitting." Starred in track as well as football at Baylor. Played in the Sugar Bowl in 1957. Can play middle guard on defense. Married, he likes hunting and fishing.



(HI) DICK FOUTS, Age 27, Wt. 240, Ht. 6'6"

Attended Missouri, Kansas and Illinois. A native of Salt Lake City, now resides in Toronto. Fouts is in his fourth season with the Argonauts, was a defensive standout at linebacker last season. Remarkable speed for his size, he is a good downfield tackler. Fills in almost anywhere when required. Originally drafted by the Los Angeles Rams, played the exhibition schedule, was injured and released, whereupon he joined the Argos. (NI) RON KISSELL, Age 23, Wt. 235, Ht. 6'2"

University of Pittsburgh. From McKeesport, Pa. Ron was with the Argos last season but due to an overcrowded import situation was released. Coach Pool considered him worth another look. Kissell was drafted ninth by the New York Giants in 1958. Played in the Sugar Bowl and the Gator Bowl in 1956. An outstanding college wrestler. Married. Kissell likes hunting, fishing and guns. Served as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army and was discharged just in time to report to the Argos.



(C) SANTO MARTINI, Age 24, Wt. 225, Ht. 6'3"

University of Toronto. Home is Toronto. Drafted as number one choice from the University of Toronto by Calgary Stampeders but dealt to Toronto where he is teaching school. Graduated from Weston Collegiate and starred on the U of T squads. Likes lacrosse, hockey and golf. Married. Hobbies are tropical fish and photography.



(III) BOBBY OLIVER, Age 23, Wt. 245, Ht. 6'2"

From Baylor University. Home town is Abilene, Texas. Oliver joined the Argos last season as a third draft choice of the Chicago Cardinals. Won honorable mention All-American, All Southwest Conference most valuable lineman in 1957. Fitted with a special shoulder brace last season which he discarded this year. Oliver promptly blocked a kick against the Rough Riders in the opening game. Plays mostly defense. Married. Hobby: Photography. Future: A business career.



(II) NICK MUMLEY, Age 22, Wt. 250, Ht. 6'6"

(H) DAVE MANN, Age 27, Wt. 195, Ht. 6'1"

Came to the Argos last year from the Chicago Cards. A fine halfback, he carried 107 times last season for 556 yards, caught 33 passes for 319 yards and punted an average of 42.0. Plays defensive half. Spent three years with the Cards beginning in 1955. Played for Fort Ord Army.

At University he was an outstanding fullback, won the Johnny Capp Memorial Trophy. Played defensively most of last season, he nevertheless carried the ball 15 times for 83 yards. (C) BOBBY KUNTZ, Age 27, Wt. 180, Ht. 5'11"

From McMaster University, Kuntz makes his home in Kitchener where he played his ORFU football for the Dutchies. From Florida State University, Philp now makes his home in Detroit. Classed as a Canadian. A flanker, he is being switched to an end position this season. Shaping up as a fine receiver this season, though last year he caught only three for 58 yards. Married. Spent two years in the army and is hoping for a teaching career.



(C) ALEX PONTON, Age 28, Wt. 220, Ht. 6'1"

McMaster U. Alex now lives in Toronto. Played three years with Ottawa before moving to Toronto where he is entering his sixth season. A linebacker, he is respected for his rugged tackling and his spirited ambition to win football games. A good student of the game. Married, he is a sales executive. Likes golf and football.



ALAN ROGERS, Ht. 6', Wt. 200, Age 24

A graduate of McMaster University, "Butch" was Argos number three draft choice in 1958. A fullback by trade, Rogers excels in the rough going at corner linebacker and has shown an aptitude to play there. From the University of Florida, he makes his home in Miami. After a slow start last season Rountree developed into a fine player both ways. In 25 carries he went 200 yards. A battering type of runner, he can go an extra two or three when he should be stopped. Voted most valuable senior at U. of Florida and selected on Associated Press All-Southeastern Conference team. At college, he was club's leading ground gainer with a 4.5 average, threw four passes and caught six for 113 yards and two TD's. Rugged blocker. Single.



(H) DICK SHATTO, Age 26, Wt. 196, Ht. 6'2"

Home town Springfield, Ohio. Shatto came to the Argonauts in 1954 on speculation after graduating from the University of Kentucky. Became one of Canada's outstanding imports. Plays halfback, fullback, flanker and, in a pinch, QB. Was an eastern All Star in 1956-57 and '58. All-Canadian in '58. MVP in Big Four in spite of an abortive effort to make him a QB during most of the season, he gained 969 yards in 1954 carries to be second in the league and was fourth leading pass receiver. Married, he has bought a home in Toronto and works for Canada Dry as a special rep.



(H) THOMAS (CORKY) THARP, Age 27, Wt. 180, Ht. 5'8"

From the University of Alabama. Home is in Birmingham, Alabama. Now in his fourth season with the club, Tharp was a late cut by the New York Giants. A tough, aggressive runner. Last year he was released after a thumb fracture but this season is back at his best. Set a scoring record at U. of Alabama. For Argos in '58 he caught three passes for 64 yards.
