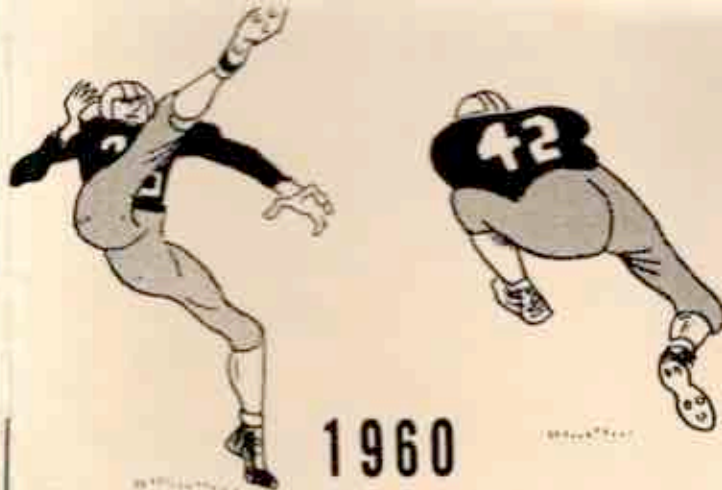

J. Barry O'Brien, President of the Ottawa Football Club, is the son of J. Ambrose O'Brien, former founder of the National Hockey League and former owner of the Montreal Canadiens.

Barry attended the Newman School in Lakewood, New Jersey, where he was an All-State Player and Captain of the football team. He also played football at the University of Toronto before leaving college for Navy duty where he held the rank of Lt. Commander in the Royal Canadian Navy.

Barry, in his second term as President, heads an efficient executive staff who are constantly striving to field a strong football team for the very loyal Rough Rider supporters.

It is anticipated that by the 1961 season there will be a new south stand to provide better and increased seating accommodations.

FRANK CLAIR

Head Coach

Frank Clair was born in Hamilton, Ohio. He attended high school there and matriculated to Ohio State University in 1938 where he played end. He was named to the All Big Ten team and was drafted by the Washington Redskins.

In 1946 Frank became assistant coach to Sid Gilman at Miami of Ohio. In 1947 he moved to Purdue where he was assistant coach to Stu Holcomb. One year later he was named Head Coach at the University of Buffalo.

In 1950 Frank took over at Toronto where he coached for five years. The Grey Cup was won in his first year, and again in 1952.

In 1956 Frank Clair came to Ottawa. He did so well in his first season, he was rewarded with a five-year contract. This will be the fourth year of his present contract.

Frank and his wife, Pat, reside in Rensselaer, Indiana, with their two children, Robin 9, and Holly 5.





BILL SMYTH
Assistant Coach

Bill Smyth claims Cincinnati, Ohio as his home town. He played his college football at Notre Dame and Cincinnati Universities.

Bill became a star lineman with the Los Angeles Rams in the NFL and played with this team for four years.

His coaching career began at Withrow High School in Cincinnati, and he later moved to Xavier University as assistant to Ed Kluska. In 1955 he came to Ottawa.

Bill is married, has four children, and makes his home in Cincinnati, Ohio, during the off-season.



GEORGE TERRY
Training Camp Coach

George Terry, an assistant coach at Louisiana State University, has been coming to Ottawa for four years to help with the defensive chores, and his help has been invaluable.

George usually remains with the Riders for five or six weeks each summer and then returns to LSU.

George Terlep was born in Elkhart, Indiana. He played quarterback and halfback at Notre Dame where he graduated from the School of Business Administration.

George played professional football with the Buffalo Bills in the All American Conference and with the Cleveland Browns.

After three years of pro ball, George turned to college coaching and had a total of eight years experience before accepting the position of backfield coach with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats who were the Grey Cup Winners.

He was Head Coach of the Saskatchewan Roughriders before coming to Ottawa. In December, 1959, he was named General Manager.

George, his wife Alma, and four children are now residing in Ottawa.

Director and
Secretary-Treasurer

Wes Brown is a native of Ottawa. He began working for the Ottawa Football Club in 1925 as Ticket Manager. He continued in this position until he became Director and Treasurer in 1936. A few years later he was chosen Secretary of the Club.

LOU BRUCE — Canadian. End, Queens University, age 25, 6 feet 205 pounds, fifth year. Member of 1955 championship team at Queens, league All-Star that year. Makes home in Toronto.

BOB SIMPSON — Canadian. End, 30 years of age, 6 feet, 210 pounds, 10th year. Home town is Windsor and lives in Ottawa where he owns a restaurant. One of the outstanding ends in Canadian football. Five times E.F.C. All-Star.

TED SMALE — Canadian. End, University of Toronto, age, 28, 6 feet 2 inches, 212 pounds, fifth year. One of the better two-way ends in the Big Four. Twice named to college All-Star squad while at Varsity. Married, three children, now makes home in Ottawa.

JON JELACIC — American. End, age 23, 6 feet 3 inches, 235 pounds, residing off-season in Brainard, Minnesota. Played college ball at U. of Minnesota. Played pro ball in NFL before coming to Ottawa last season.

TACKLES

GILLES ARCHAMBAULT — Canadian. Tackle, 6 feet 2 inches, 250 pounds, age 26. Played with Montreal and Calgary before coming to Ottawa in 1956. He also starred in hockey and tennis. Named to eastern Shrine team in 1958. He is married and lives in Ottawa.

JOHN BOVE — Canadian. Attended U. of West Virginia. He is 6 feet 1 inch, 240 pounds and in his seventh year with the Rough Riders. Originally from Auburn, N.Y., John is now a Canadian and makes his home in Ottawa where he has a Service Station.

MILT GRAHAM — American. Tackle, 6 feet 6 inches, 245 pounds, age 24. Played end at Colgate University where he was All-Eastern and won mention on All-American. He is one of the top tackles in the league. Married. Milt's home is in Boston.

TOM JONES — American. Tackle, age 28, 6 feet 5 inches, 275 pounds, fifth year with Ottawa. One of the biggest linemen in Canadian football. Had some experience in National Football League with Browns, Steelers and Rams. Was All-Mid American Conference while at Miami of Ohio in 1952-53-54. All American in 1954 and in 1955 was member of the College All Star team which beat the Browns.

MOE RACINE — Canadian. Tackle, played fullback in high school, 6 feet 4 inches, 235 pounds age 22, second year with Ottawa. Single, he makes his home in Cornwall.

ANGELO MOSCA — American. Tackle, age 25, 6 feet 5 inches, 260 pounds, played at Notre Dame University and a two-year regular with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Angelo is a strong defensive tackle and was acquired in a trade with Hardeman Cureton. Resides in Hamilton Ontario but plans to make Ottawa his home and become a Canadian citizen.

STUART SMITH — Canadian. Tackle, age 21, 6 feet 2 inches, 235 pounds, 2nd year with Ottawa. A fine high school tackle with Tech. Smith played two years with St. Anthony junior teams and is regarded as a fine prospect. A big, rugged youngster, Coach Clair hopes Smith will make a defensive tackle spot. Single, he makes his home in Ottawa, and is employed with the Eddy Paper Co.

HOWARD HAMLIN — Canadian. Tackle, age 19, 6 feet 3 inches, 225 pounds, first year with club, played last year with Cornwall and is regarded as a fine prospect. Makes his home in Ottawa and is the son of Dr. H. Hamlin, a Star tackle in the 30's.

GUARDS

MERV COLLINS — Canadian. Guard, fifth year for the Rough Riders, 6 feet 1 inch, 220 pounds, age 26. Played with Argonauts and Hamilton before coming to Ottawa. Merv makes his home in Toronto.

LARRY HAYES — American. Guard, age 25, 6 feet 3 inches, 215 pounds, fifth year of ball for Ottawa. Played at Vanderbilt University. In 1957, Larry was named to the Big Four and eastern all-star teams as a linebacker. Single, he resides in Old Hickory, Tennessee.

SAM SCOCCIA — Canadian. Guard, age 30, 5 feet 11 inches, 240 pounds, sixth year with Riders. Played 3 seasons with Saskatchewan before being purchased by Ottawa. A fine guard. Sam was a member of both Junior and Intermediate championship teams at Hamilton. Married, his home is in Hamilton.

KAYE VAUGHAN — American. Tackle, played at University of Tulsa. Canada's top lineman in 1956 and '57, 6 feet 2 inches, 229 pounds, age 29, eighth year with the Rough Riders. He twice won the Schenley Award as the top lineman, Big Four all-star, All-Canadian and chosen for the Shrine Games. Kaye is married and lives in Montreal.

FRED ROBINSON — American. Guard, 6 feet 1 inch, 240 pounds, 28 years of age. He attended Washington University and made the All-Pacific Coast Team as a tackle. He made United Press All American honorable mention and Colliers All American Team. Was a regular guard with Cleveland Browns in 1956-57 and with Toronto in 1958. His home is Seattle, Washington.

CENTERS

BRUNO BITKOWSKI — Canadian. Center, 6 feet 2 inches, 220 pounds, age 23, 8th year with Ottawa. Attended Assumption College. Bruno won the Big Four rookie award in 1951. In 1954 he won the team MVP award and the Walker Trophy. Married, the Bitkowskis have a boy and girl.

JERRY SELINGER — Canadian. Center, age 25, 6 feet, 215 pounds 4th year with Riders. Had scholarship at St. Joseph's College, Indiana. Jerry is married and makes his home in Hamilton.

JOE STRACINA — Canadian. Center and linebacker, age 28, 5 feet 11 inches, 220 pounds, 5th year with Ottawa. Joe learned his football around Montreal and played with Regina before coming to the Rough Riders. He played with the Dominion championship Lakeshore team in 1953. Joe lives in Montreal with his wife and two children.

QUARTERBACKS

RUES JACKSON — Canadian. Quarterback, age 22, 6 feet 1 inch, 190 pounds, third year with the Riders. Russ came to Ottawa from McMaster University. Last year he won the Schenley Award as the outstanding Canadian. Single, he makes his home in Hamilton.

RON LANCASTER — American. Quarterback, 5 feet 10 inches, 180 pounds, age 21, a graduate from Wittenberg College in Springfield, O. Ron was chosen All Ohio Conference in 1957 and '59 and co-captain of the Wittenberg team in '59 as well as team's most valuable player. He also made All Ohio College team.

HALFBACKS

BILL SOWALSKI — Canadian. Halfback and Corner Linebacker, age 29, 5 feet 11 inches, 260 pounds, 6th year with Ottawa. Played football at Hamilton Central High School and Brantford Intermediate team. He was named to the 1958 Canadian Press team, Globe and Mail All-Canadian team and the Shrine Eastern team. Bill lives in Ottawa with his wife and child.

JOE KELLY — American. Halfback, age 23, 5 feet 11 inches, weight 203 pounds, 2nd year with the Riders. Joe attended New Mexico State University in the Border Conference where he was chosen Most Valuable Back in 1955 and '57 and most valuable player in 1958. Drafted by Los Angeles Rams and came to Riders last season. Joe is married and lives in Pacoima, Cal. in off-season.

GARY SCHREIDER — Canadian. Halfback, age 26, 5 feet 10 inches, 185 pounds, 4th year with Ottawa. Gary was a member of the 1955 Queen's University championship team. In 1956 he led the league in punt returns. Married, Gary makes his home in Ottawa.

Halfbacks Con't

GEORGE BRANCATO — American. Halfback, 5 feet 10 inches 178 pounds, age 28, 4th year with the Club. In 1957 led league in pass interceptions. Played 2 years with Chicago Cards and then with Montreal before coming to Ottawa. George is married and teaches in the off-season at St. Patricks College, Ottawa.

RON STEWART — Canadian. Halfback, age 24, 5 feet 8 inches, 175 pounds, 3rd year with Riders. An all-time great at Queen's University. Ron holds the school scoring record and was a member of the '55 championship team. Ron is single and makes his home in Toronto.

DAVE WEST — Canadian. Halfback, 5 feet 9 inches, age 32, 175 pounds, 2nd year at Ottawa. In the last 13 years, Davey has played with every pro club in Canada except Montreal. He has also played a lot of hockey and baseball. Married, with two children, he is a professional photographer in Vancouver, B.C.

DOUG DAIGNEAULT — Canadian. Halfback, 6 feet 2 inches, age 23, 192 pounds. College ball was played at Clemson, and he played a big part in their winning the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship and their triumph over Texas Christian in the Blue Bonnet Bowl. Doug lives in Malone, N.Y. in the off-season.

JOE POIRIER — Canadian. Halfback, 6 feet 1 inch, 185 pounds, age 22, attended Loyola and McGill Universities. Joe was voted the outstanding Canadian in the Big Four last year after coming to the Riders from Vancouver. He is single and lives in Verdun, Que.

RICHARD KASER — American. Halfback, attended Toledo University, 6 feet, 190 pounds, age 26. He was All Mid-American Conference and All Ohio in his last college season and was selected to play in the 1954 College All Star Game. Toledo is his off-season home.

COLLINS HAGLER — American. Halfback, 5 feet 9 inches, age 25, 170 pounds, coming to Ottawa from Saskatchewan. Played college ball at the University of Iowa and in 1956 played in the Rose Bowl Game. He established a new school record in punt and kickoff returns. Mike is married and has two children.

FULLBACKS

GERRY NESBITT — American. Fullback, 2nd year with the Riders, 27 years old, 5 feet 10 inches, 300 pounds. Gerry played ball at Arkansas University where he was a member of the 1954 Southwest championship team. He is married, has three children and makes his home in Little Rock, Ark.

DAVE THELEN — American. Fullback or halfback, 2nd year with Ottawa, 6 feet, age 22, 200 pounds. Played with Miami of Ohio. He was named All Mid-American in 1956 and '57, All Ohio in 1957 and also All Mid West. Single, he lives in East Canton, Ohio.

JIM CONROY — Canadian. Fullback, born in Vancouver, age 22, 6 feet, 195 pounds. Jim played at the University of Southern California where he was a regular defensive corner linebacker and defensive fullback. He is one of the two Canadians with American College experience to come with the Rough Riders this season.

RULE CHANGES FOR THE 1960 PLAYING SEASON

1. The zone restriction on interference by the eligible players of the attacking team on running plays from scrimmage was removed. (NOTE: A forward pass completed behind the line of scrimmage becomes a running play after the pass is completed.)
2. Interference privileges were granted to all players of a team intercepting a pass after the ball is caught. (NOTE: This is a clean catch, not a knockdown and recovery in the case of a lateral pass.)
3. The restriction on the number of times a hand-off ball exchange, in a forward direction, may be made, and the number of players making such hand-offs by the attacking team, behind their line of scrimmage, on scrimmage plays, was removed.
4. The use of metal cleats and the hollowing or concaving of cleats at the end coming in contact with the ground was banned. A cleat must not be less than 3/16 of an inch in any dimension where the cleat comes in contact with the ground.
5. Grasping an opponent's face-guard was set out specifically as illegal and to be ruled under the unnecessary roughness penalty.
6. Added protection was granted the kicker; he may not be contacted while in the act of kicking when he kicks from a regular formation and remains in the kicking formation while making the kick. This includes quick-kicking from formation.

Only protection insofar as contact is unnecessarily rough is granted a kicker who leaves the formation to kick (i.e. - run-kick play, return kicking).

To implement this rule, the act of kicking was defined as that time during a kick when the kicker's foot leaves the ground until it returned to the ground.
7. The penalty of 10 yards for a fumble into touch was deleted.
8. The recovery of a fumble by another on-side member of the same team was incorporated as legal.
9. An option to the receiving team of scrimmaging the ball 20 yards in from where it crossed the touch line on kick-offs was granted.
10. The penalty to a captain for pursuing a complaint after the decision has been explained was reduced to 10 yards from 15 yards to conform to other like penalties.
11. The rule prohibiting simultaneous completion by two eligible receivers of the same team on forward pass plays was deleted.
12. The interpretation that an eligible receiver of the attacking team, in making an attempt to catch the ball on a forward pass play, has made an off-side pass if he tips the ball forward before securing it, was deleted.
