Foreword

This information booklet is respectfully dedicated to both the fans who have so enthusiastically supported the Tiger-Cats, and the many writers and radio and television announcers who cover Pro Football in general, and the Tiger-Cats in particular so thoroughly.

Set forth herein are some facts and figures of the 1964 Tiger-Cats their operation and personnel, in the sincere hope that they will provide an assist in getting to know the Tiger-Cats better.

From the beginning of the 1964 season, we realized that as current champions, that all teams would be "shooting" at us and that we would have to be a better team than the 1963 team if we wanted to stay on top. We were conscious that to be better we would have to improve offensively and defensively at halfback. Four speedsters, offensive backs Johnny Counts and Bob Gaiters from the N.F.L., and defensive backs Jackie Simpson and Dick Cobee from the C.F.L., were acquired to give the team the overall halfback balance and depth that we sought. Other first year players such as John Cimba, Stan Crisson and Ed Hoerster have played prominent roles in the team's success.

For the eleventh time in 15 years the Tiger-Cats have finished in first place in regular league play and have won the Eastern Canadian Championship for the fourth consecutive year.

Although it is unrealistic to assume that we can continuously stay on top of the League, all of our fans and the members of the press, radio and t.v. sports media can be assured that everyone in our organization will continue to be dedicated to so doing.

J. G. "Jake" GAUDAUR
General Manager

Born in Orillia, Ontario, this year he will be serving his twenty-fifth consecutive year in Professional Football as player and executive.

He first came to Hamilton in 1940 to play Lacrosse and train to row under the World's Champion, Bob Pearce. He also played his first year in the Big Four with the Hamilton Tigers that year.

In 1941 he played with Toronto Argonauts and in 1942 with the R.C.A.F. Hurricanes who that year won the Grey Cup. He served as a pilot in the R.C.A.F., 1942-1945. In 1945 and 1946 he was team captain and was one of the eight players who bought and operated the franchise of the Toronto Indians in the O.R.F.U. In 1947 he played with and was co-captain of Montreal Alouettes. In 1948 and 1949 he played with O.R.F.U. champion Hamilton Tigers and was team captain. In 1950 and 1951 he played with and was team captain of the newly-formed Tiger-Cats and retired in 1952 to become a director of the Club. In 1953 he came out of retirement when the American Centre was injured, to play with the Tiger-Cats, who were the Grey Cup Champions that year.

In 1954 he became President of the Tiger-Cats and has remained in that position ever since. In 1956 he became General Manager, and since that time has served in both the capacity of President and General Manager.

He was President of the Big Four in 1959, President of the Canadian Football League in 1962 and is currently the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Football Hall of Fame and Museum and Chairman of the Big Four and Canadian Football League U.S. T.V. Committees.

A native Hamiltonian, Frank has been associated with Hamilton Football most of his life. In 1949 he joined the Hamilton Tigers in the O.R.F.U. as Treasurer. He was a key person in the formation of the Tiger-Cats in 1950 and since that time has been Secretary-Treasurer and Director of the Club.

Very active in League affairs, he has for many years been Chairman of the Schedule Committee. He was the Eastern Representative on the two-man C.F.L. Committee, with Ralph Parliament, and between them they have developed all of the statistical information which enabled the Interlocking Schedule to come into being. He was President of the E.F.C. in 1963 and is currently the Secretary-Treasurer of the E.F.C.

Team Manager

Len's association with Hamilton Football began in 1918 as a Junior Player. He managed Intermediate clubs from 1920 to 1928 and has been associated with the senior representative from Hamilton as a Team Manager from 1928 to the present day.

In Hamilton, Len for many years has been "Mr. Football" and his contribution to the game was recognized three years ago when he was awarded the Annual C.R.U. Award presented at the Grey Cup Dinner in Vancouver.

Meet the Coaches . . .



RALPH SAZIO
Head Coach

Born in South Orange, N.J., Ralph first joined the Tiger-Cats in 1950 as an import tackle. He was recruited by the then Head Coach and General Manager, Carl Voyles, for whom he had played at William and Mary College and the Brooklyn Dodgers in the All America Pro Conference.

He has been with the Tiger-Cats as a player or coach for the past thirteen years and had been Coach Trimble's number one assistant since 1956.

In the thirteen years Ralph has been in Canadian football, he has turned down several offers of a head coaching position, to remain in Hamilton and the Tiger-Cats were extremely pleased when Ralph decided to accept the appointment as Head Coach of the Tiger-Cats in 1963.

In his first year, he showed his willingness to "look ahead" in that he selected five rookie Canadians, three of them directly from High School and he displayed that Hamilton had not lost any connections with the National Football League by acquiring such outstanding pros as Art Baker, Gene Gossage and Jim Pace to round out a team that was capable of defeating Ottawa in the Eastern Playoffs and which was capable of winning the Grey Cup for the first time since 1957.

Instead of standing pat with his 1963 championship team, Ralph did not hesitate to make replacements when he thought such would improve the team. Nine new players: Johnny Counts, John Cimba, Bob Galters, Jackie Simpson, Dick Cahoe, Stan Crisson, Ed Koerster, John Metras and Mike Duffy went on the 1964 roster and contributed substantially to the Club finishing in first place in the Eastern Division for the fourth consecutive year.

Apart from football, Ralph is a successful business man in various fields and has been particularly active in community welfare work. The Sazios—his wife Rose and their two children have lived in the Hamilton area since coming here in 1950.



JOE RESTIC
Assistant Coach

Joe comes to Hamilton from Colgate University where for the past five years he was the offensive backfield and end coach, and was rated very highly there.

He was an outstanding college player at Villanova and in 1950-51 he made the big jump to the Philadelphia Eagles, and under Head Coach Jim Trimble, was a very effective offensive end and defensive halfback.

In 1962 he signed as assistant coach with the Tiger-Cats and is considered an excellent game scout. He scouts players for the Tiger-Cats in the off season.

This year he was a top consideration for the position of Head Coach of the Edmonton Eskimos but instead signed a two year contract with the Tiger-Cats.



KELLEY MOTE
Assistant Coach

Kelley Mote first went to College at Duke and played against Coach Sazio. He transferred to and graduated from the University of North Carolina and played professionally for five years in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions and the New York Giants, his last three years, 1950, 1951 and 1952, were under Steve Owen at the Giants. Since then he has had extensive line coaching experience at North Carolina, Columbia and Colgate.

Coach Sazio signed Kelley within two weeks of the date he was named head coach of the Tiger-Cats and this year signed him to a further two year contract.

Kelley is married with two children and operates a farm in the off season in Georgia.

Playing Personnel

Ends

STAN CRISSON, American, 6' 1", 205 pounds, 22 years of age. Stan is a graduate of Duke University and was the second top pass receiver in the U.S. College ranks in 1963, catching 48 passes for a total of 559 yards. He scored 7 touchdowns in the 1963 season. Stan has been the regular right end for the Tiger-Cats this season and although used mainly as a blocker, he caught several passes and appears headed for a bright future in Canadian football.

PETE NEUMANN, Canadian, 5' 11", 217 pounds, 33 years of age. There was rejoicing in the ranks when powerful Peter decided to play one more season of pro football with Hamilton. This will be his 14th season since moving directly from the St. Catharines Collegiate Tricolour to the Cats in 1951. He has been a league all-star almost every season. A great positional player, Pete is quick as a cat, is an expert play "reader" and hits with devastating power.

HAL PATTERSON, American, 6' 1", 195 pounds, 31 years of age. Prince Hal who came into Canadian football from the University of Kansas, has written some bright pages in the history of the modern game, and is recognized as perhaps the greatest end ever to play in Canada. He came to Hamilton in trade in 1961 and has continued his outstanding career. In 1964 he was the team's 2nd best receiver, catching 31 passes for a total of 657 yards and 6 touchdowns.

DAVE VITI, American, 6' 2", 220 pounds, 24 years of age. Dave was a prize Cat catch in 1962. He was a high draft choice of Washington in the N.F.L. and Buffalo in the A.F.L. after two great performances in post-season Bowl games with the University of Boston, but decided to play in Canada. In 1963 he was the team's third best receiver, catching 27 passes for a total of 361 yards. In 1964 he was switched to defensive end and has developed into one of the outstanding players at this position in the League.

Tackles

JOHN BARROW, American, 6' 2", 255 pounds, 28 years of age. John was chosen as Canada's outstanding lineman in 1962 and was both All-Canadian and All-Eastern defensive tackle. He is the heart of the Hamilton defense, is an expert tackler and explosive in his rush on opposing quarterbacks. He joined Hamilton in 1957 after winning All-American honours at the University of Florida. An All-Canadian in 1963, Barrow will certainly be recognized as one of the greatest players in the history of the Canadian game.

GENO DENOBILE, Canadian, 6' 1", 236 pounds, 32 years of age. Geno is a Hamilton native who came to the Cats from the intermediate league and is now in his 9th season in Pro. He came out of retirement this year at the request of Coach Sazio when Cureton was injured and has played an important role in the team's success.

ED HOERSTER, American, 6' 2", 230 pounds, 23 years of age. Ed joined the Argonauts from the Buffalo Bills at the start of the 1963 season. Drafted No. 16 by Buffalo in the A.F.L. and 13th by the Chicago Bears of the N.F.L., he played centre and linebacker at Notre Dame and also captained the squad. He was acquired from Toronto this year and has played effectively as a defensive end and linebacker and offensively at tackle.

ANGELO MOSCA, American, 6' 4", 272 pounds, 28 years of age. Ang came into Canadian football from Notre Dame, broke in with Hamilton and then, in trades, played with Montreal and Ottawa before returning to the Tiger-Cats in 1962. His bone-crunching line play was one of the key factors in Hamilton's great 1963 Grey Cup win. In recognition of his all round performance playing offensively and defensively, he was named the Top Lineman in the Big Four last year and was a nominee for the Schenley Award as Top C.F.L. Lineman of the Year.

BRONKO NAGURSKI, Canadian, 6' 1", 259 pounds, 26 years of age. Born in Canada, this son of the famous fullback father also attended Notre Dame University, came to Hamilton in his graduating year, and has been an offensive regular ever since. In his last year with the "Fighting Irish", "Bronk" played both in the All-American Bowl Game and the East-West Shrine game. In 1962 he was named to the All-Canadian pro team.

JOE PIKULA, Canadian, 6' 3", 252 pounds, 20 years old. He attends St. John's College in Brantford and was flushed out of the Canadian Training Camp last year as a prospect by Coach Sazio. An aggressive youngster with both size and speed he played regularly throughout the 1963 season and it appears that he is destined to have a great future in Canadian Professional Football.

Guards - Linebackers

HARDIMAN CURETON, Canadian, 5' 11", 235 pounds, 29 years of age. "Hardy", who played college football at U.C.L.A. was obtained from the Ottawa Roughriders in 1960 in a deal involving Angelo Mosca. Now in his fourth full season with Hamilton, Cureton has seen service as an offensive centre, guard, tackle and linebacker. In 1963 he was named to the All-Eastern team as an offensive guard and enjoyed one of his best seasons.

GENE GOSSAGE, American, 6' 4", 242 pounds, 29 years of age. A four year veteran of the National Football League, Gossage played regular offensive guard with the Philadelphia Eagles on their championship team a few years ago and in 1962 as a defensive end. He was traded to the New York Giants in 1963 for Bill Quinlan and he came to the Tiger-Cats directly from the New York Giants. In 1963 he was used principally as a defensive end with the Tiger-Cats. In 1964 he has gone all the way at offensive guard and has been a key to the resurgence of the Hamilton running game.

ELLISON KELLY, American, 6' 3", 255 pounds, 27 years of age. Making the Eastern Conference all-star team at guard is no novelty for likeable Ellison who joined the Hamilton Tiger-Cats halfway through the 1960 season after a stint with the New York Giants. Although Ellison is primarily an offensive guard, he can play offensive tackle, linebacker or defensive end if required. Last year, he and teammate Hardiman Cureton were the league's all-star guards.

Centres

GENE CEPPELELLI, Canadian, 6' 1", 235 pounds, 24 years of age. Gene is a Sudbury boy who played first-string centre for Villanova University for two years before joining the Tiger-Cats. He was a member of the Villanova team which almost upset top-ranked Oregon in the Liberty Bowl Game in 1962. In his first two years in Pro with the Tiger-Cats, he has been a first string defensive tackle.

JOHN METRAS, Canadian, 6' 2", 215 pounds, 23 years of age. John graduated from the University of Western this past season and while there was an all star centre and linebacker. He was drafted by the Toronto Argonauts and acquired from them in mid season by the Tiger-Cats.

CHESTER MIKSZA, Canadian, 6' 2", 240 pounds, 32 years of age. "Chet", is a home-brew Hamilton player, who performed in high school and junior in the city, joining the Tiger-Cats in 1952. With the Cats, Chet has played offensive centre and both ways at tackle. He is also a better-than-average punter and place-kicker. In 1963 the Coaches agreed that Chet had his best year since joining the Tiger-Cats.

Quarterbacks

FRANK COSENTINO, Canadian, 6' 3", 195 pounds, 26 years of age. 1962 saw this fine young quarterback really come of age in pro football. The unfortunate injury which sidelined Bernie Faloney placed Cosentino and rookie import Joe Zuger right on the firing line. Frank, who attended Cathedral High School in Hamilton and the University of Western Ontario, jumped into national prominence and gave some unforgettable displays of passing and running. In 1963 and 1964 he was the back up quarterback who came in on many occasions to relieve Bernie Faloney.

BERNIE FALONEY, Canadian, 6', 198 pounds, 32 years of age. After winning the Schenley Award in 1961 as Canada's Most Outstanding football player, Bernie faced the 1962 season with unbounded enthusiasm. Unfortunately, an injury which required later surgery, knocked him out of the Hamilton lineup and Faloney was forced to watch most of Hamilton's Grey Cup bid from the sidelines. An All-American at the University of Maryland and an outstanding star with the Edmonton Eskimos, Faloney came to Hamilton in 1957 and led the Cats through some memorable seasons. In 1963 and 1964 Bernie returned to the farm that enabled him to be named Canada's Outstanding player in 1961 and led the team to a Grey Cup Championship.

JOE ZUGER, American, 6' 2", 212 pounds, 24 years of age. Joe joined the Tiger-Cats in 1962 after leading all U.S. college players in both punting and pass interceptions and was regarded as the finest quarterback in Arizona State's history. With Hamilton, Joe was used as a defensive half-back until the injury to Faloney in 1962 and then he and Cosentino shared the signal-calling job. Against the Saskatchewan Roughriders, he virtually re-wrote the record book, establishing a new mark (8) in touchdown passes and total yardage passing. He is considered to be on the road to a brilliant career in all three of the football facets he favours, punting, quarterbacking and pass interceptions.

Backs

ART BAKER, American, 6', 225 pounds, 26 years of age. A graduate of the University of Syracuse, Art while there broke the rushing records originally established by the great Jim Brown and he was a number one draft selection of both the N.F.L. and the A.F.L. and was aggressively sought after by Montreal when he graduated. Art came from the Buffalo Bills to the Tiger-Cats and plays offensively at fullback and defensively as an inside linebacker. Although he joined the team late in the 1963 season, he had an amazing average of 8.8 yards per carry and in 1964 gained 726 yards, 3rd best in the League.

WILLIE BETHEA, American, 6', 190 pounds, 25 years of age. Bethea primarily a quick-hitting back, played with the Patterson, N.J. Miners in 1962 and was the league-leading rusher and scorer in the Atlantic Coast Conference. He has the ability to run both inside and out and is a better-than-average pass receiver. Although injured in the first League game and out of action for six weeks, he has gained 408 yards.

JOHN CIMBA, Canadian, 6', 210 pounds, 22 years of age. A native of Grimsby, John attended the University of Buffalo where he had an outstanding Collegiate football career. Extremely versatile he was one of his team's top offensive and defensive backs and returned kickoffs and punts. In his rookie year John has seen considerable action as a corner linebacker in regular league play.

DICK COHEE, American, 6' 1", 190 pounds, 25 years of age. Dick is one of the most versatile backs in Canadian Football. He was obtained from Regina in mid season and plays regularly as a defensive back with the Tiger-Cats although he is capable of playing offensively as a back or end.

JOHN COUNTS, American, 5' 10", 175 pounds, 25 years of age. For the past three seasons John has played as a regular member of the New York Giants and although he was used primarily as a kickoff and punt returner, he was a back-up offensive halfback and flanker. With his great speed and ability to run inside and out, John has rushed for 508 yards, sixth best in the eastern division.

MIKE DUFFY, Canadian, 6', 180 pounds, 24 years of age. Mike is a product of the Burlington Braves junior team from which team he graduated in 1963. He played with the Oakville Black Knights Intermediate team in 1964 and was signed by the Tiger-Cats to replace the injured Steve Hmiel. He has outstanding potential as a receiver and punter.

BOB GAITERS, American, 6', 210 pounds, 25 years of age. Bob was one of the outstanding halfbacks in the history of New Mexico State and was a top draft choice of the New York Giants. He has played three years in the N.F.L. and has the power to run inside and the speed to run outside. Bob has the background and ability to be an outstanding back in Canadian Pro.

RALPH GOLDSTON, Canadian, 5' 11", 190 pounds, 34 years of age. The hard-rock veteran of the Tiger-Cats is starting his 9th season with Hamilton after coming to the Hamilton club from the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League. Actually, it was a Philadelphia to Green Bay trade which sent "Goldie" to his old boss Jim Trimble in Canada. He is "Mr. Versatility" in that he is a fullback and blocking back offensively a linebacker or defensive halfback. The 1962 league statistics show he had a 3.7 average carry, scored 14 points, intercepted two passes, had a 17 yard average in punt returns and even returned one kickoff for five yards. Pound for pound he packs as mighty a wallop as any tackler in the game.

TOMMY GRANT, Canadian, 5' 11", 200 pounds, 29 years of age. Tom was spawned in that great cradle of Canadian athletes, Windsor AKO and is also accomplished in basketball and baseball. In 1963 he had one of the finest years of his career, scoring 42 points, receiving 40 passes for 834 yards, returning 34 punts for 256 yards and returning 8 kickoffs for a total of 209 yards. In 1964 he caught 44 passes and his 1029 yards gained was the best in the League.

GARNEY HENLEY, American, 6', 180 pounds, 26 years of age. Garney enjoyed what could only be termed a "spectacular" 1962 season, climaxed by an unforgettable performance in the Grey Cup game against the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. He joined Hamilton after being released by the Green Bay Packers in late 1960, had an impressive rookie season and then went on to be one of the most talked-about performers in Canada. He has great native speed, a bewildering change of pace and is a certain-as-Death receiver. For his play in 1963, he won the Jeff Russell Award as the League's Most Valuable Player. In 1964 he intercepted 6 passes tied for best in the League.

STEVE HMIEL, Canadian, 6', 195 pounds, 26 years of age. Steve made it with the Tiger-Cats in 1960 but was traded to Ottawa. Because he did not want to leave Hamilton he did not report. A tough competitor, he was acquired last year from Ottawa in the Gary Schreider trade. As a down field tackler it is agreed by most experts that he has no peer in Canada in this department and in one year his tackling has become almost legendary.

ZENO KARCZ, Canadian, 5' 11", 200 pounds, 28 years of age. Zeno is another Windsor AKO product who played one year at the University of Michigan, and is now looking back on eight seasons with the Tiger-Cats. His rugged linebacking earned him a spot on the 1962 All-Eastern team and in 1963 he was regarded as one of the top corner linebackers in the League.

BOB KROUSE, Canadian, 6' 1", 190 pounds, 21 years of age. Bob came into the Tiger-Cat camp direct from Central Collegiate in Hamilton where he had won several athletic awards and had been named to the Spectator High School All-Star team for the three years. A hard hitting tackler and runner, he is considered an outstanding immediate prospect.

BOBBY KUNTZ, Canadian, 5' 11", 197 pounds, 32 years of age. The aggressive Bobby has played with the Toronto Argonauts for six seasons and was a perennial All-Star with them. During that time he was rated the outstanding corner linebacker in the League. In 1961 he took over the fullback job from Cookie Gilchrist. In 1962 he was acquired in trade from Toronto and as the Tiger-Cat fullback he gained 813 yards rushing, the second best in the League. In 1964 he went all the way as an inside linebacker on defense and his bone crushing tackling was a major factor in the Tiger-Cats having the least points scored against in the E.F.C.

JACKIE SIMPSON, American, 6', 195 pounds, 29 years of age. He joined the Tiger-Cats this year after the first League game. He was a teammate of John Barrow at the University of Florida and graduated the same year. Although he joined the Tiger-Cats after the season opened in 1964, he has intercepted 5 passes, 2nd best in the League.

DON SUTHERIN, American, 6', 200 pounds, 28 years of age. Don, who is a defensive halfback, handles Hamilton's fieldgoal and convert kicking and has been a dominant figure in Canadian pro football. He joined the Tiger-Cats via the New York Giants and Pittsburgh Steelers. In 1962 he led the Eastern conference in pass interceptions, 8 for a return of 95 yards, was third in scoring with 78 points, was fourth in punt returns and made All-Canadian as a defensive halfback. In 1961, he led the league in both scoring and pass interceptions. In 1964 he again led the E.F.C. in scoring with 94 points.
