K. J. (Ken) PRESTON

General Manager

The Dean of General Managers in the Canadian Football League, Ken is heading into his 15th season as general manager of the Saskatchewan Roughrider Football Club. He is one of only two Canadians who hold down the position of General Manager in the country's only professional football league.

Born in Ontario, Ken played college football at Queen's University, where he obtained his Commerce Degree. He joined the Regina Roughriders in 1940, but moved to Winnipeg Blue Bombers the following season and helped the Manitoba club capture the Grey Cup that fall.

Ken spent the next three years in the armed services, and joined the Ottawa Rough Riders in 1945. He returned to the Roughriders in 1946, the year the club became known as the Saskatchewan Roughriders. Ken retired in 1948 to devote full time to a manufacturing business in Regina. Ten years later, Ken was engaged as General Manager of the Roughriders, and in 1961 he sold his business interests to devote his entire energy towards the position he presently holds.

He is highly respected by all of the other General Managers in the Canadian Football League and is a member of the CFL rules committee. Much of the success achieved by the Saskatchewan Roughriders in the last 14 years can be traced to the work of the General Manager. His efforts have paid off to the extent that the club has improved from last place in the Western Football Conference in the late 1950's to become a perennial contender for the WFC Championship each and every year. The Roughriders captured their first-ever Grey Cup Championship in 1966, were finalists in 1967 and 1969 and in 1970 chalked up their greatest-ever winning record with 14 wins and two losses during the regular schedule.

DAVE SKRIEN

Head Coach

A graduate of the University of Minnesota. Following a two-year stint in the U.S. Armed Services, Dave signed as a fullback with the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1953.

However, the Roughriders had the veteran Bobby Marlow in tow and Dave was sent to Winnipeg Blue Bombers. An interception by Skrien in the final two minutes of the Western Football Conference final against Edmonton Eskimos put the Bombers into the Grey Cup final that year.

Dave returned to the University of Minnesota to complete his Masters Degree and in 1955 made his coaching debut at Albert Lee high school in Minnesota. He joined the Ball State football staff in 1956 and in 1957 was named an assistant to Murray Warmath at the University of Minnesota.

Dave was named backfield coach of the B.C. Lions in 1959 and was elevated to the head coach position in 1961. He guided the Lions to the only Grey Cup victory in their history, defeating Hamilton Tiger-Cats 34-24 in 1964.

The fortunes of the Lions quickly turned and Skrien left the club in 1967 to accept a coaching position with Boise State College. He returned to the WFC in 1969 as an assistant with the Edmonton Eskimos, moving to the Roughriders in a similar role in 1970.

When Eagle Keys resigned as head coach the Management Committee looked no further than Dave Skrien to fill the post in 1971.

Dave and his wife, Dee, have three sons.

JOHN PAYNE

Assistant Coach



A native of Wewoka, Okla., John won Missouri Valley Conference all-star honors in 1953 and was named to play in the Blue-Gray classic in 1954 as guard. He was named coach of the Oklahoma State University freshman team in 1955 and accepted the position of a Tulsa High School line coach in 1956. He later moved to Tulsa McLean High School where he served as athletic director and coach from

1959-1962. He was named coach of the year in Oklahoma in 1962 and the following year was named defensive coach at Oklahoma Central State College.

Tommy Hudspeth lured John to Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, as his assistant in 1965.

John made his Western Football Conference debut in 1968 when he joined Neil Armstrong's coaching staff at Edmonton. John remained with the Eskimos for two years, joining Jim Spavital in Winnipeg in 1970.

When Skrien was named Head Coach of the Riders in 1971, he signed John as Assistant Coach.

John and his wife, Dorothy, have four children.



AL EVANS

Assistant Coach

Al came to the Roughriders this year after four years as an assistant coach at Wisconsin State at Whitewater. He is no stranger to Dave Skrien as he was recruited as an assistant by Dave when he was Head Coach of the B.C. Lions in 1967. Prior to that time he had been an assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin at Madison in 1966 and at River Falls in 1964 and 1965. From 1960 to 1963 he was Head Coach at Dakota State College in Valley City, North Dakota.

Al was a 6-ft., 210-lb. All-Conference lineman at South Dakota State and captained the squad to an undefeated season and conference championship in 1953.

After graduating from University, Al became a member of the U.S. Armed Services and played service football in Europe. In 1958 and 1959 he gained two years experience in Canadian football with the London Lords.

Alan is 39 years of age. He and his wife Sharon are residing in Regina.

Keeping a complete inventory of the Rider equipment and arranging for off-season repair work to the club's gear has made his position a year-round one.

JACK ABENDSCHAN—With 597 points scored over seven seasons, Jack is the all-time leading scorer of the Roughrider Club. As an offensive guard, he has been named to the All-Canadian team for the past three years. The University of New Mexico graduate is 6'1", 245 lbs., and 29 years of age. He is employed as Personnel Director of Sask. Tel. Jack and his wife Virginia have two daughters.

DON BAHNUK—Another graduate of the Regina Ram Junior Club, Don made his debut with the Roughriders in 1966, the year they won the Grey Cup. He was an all-star offensive and defensive tackle with the Rams. In 1969, Don became a regular defensive tackle. He had a fine year in 1970 but was hampered by a knee injury last season. Don is 6'2" and 245 lbs., with the speed and quickness to go with his size. He was married in May of this year, and is employed with the Tourist Branch of the Department of Industry & Commerce of the Saskatchewan Government.



NOLAN BAILEY—A graduate of Prairie View A & M, Nolan is heading into his third season with the Roughriders as a starting tight end. Drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in 1969, Nolan was unable to displace such veterans as Mike Ditke and Pettie Norman. Nolan, 25 is 6'3" and weighs 245 lbs. He is a strong blocker and has proved most difficult to bring down after making a reception. In his rookie year, Nolan caught 30 passes for 475 yards for an average of 15.8 yards per reception. A solid addition to the Roughrider Club last year, despite a shoulder injury which bothered him most of the season, Nolan caught 36 passes for 597 yards. Nolan is single.

BILL BAKER—A native of Regina, Bill received a football scholarship at Otterbolen College where he was an Ohio Conference All-Star for two years. At 6'3" and 255 lbs., Bill is developing into one of the finest defensive ends in the C.F.L. He was named to the W.F.C. All-Star team in 1971. Bill is 27 years of age and will be playing his fourth season with the Roughriders. He and his wife Linda have two daughters. Bill is Manager of the Saskatchewan Forestry Association.



GORDON BARWELL—He is another of the several Roughrider players who have successfully made the jump directly from junior ranks to professional ball. Gord, 28 is a flanker and split end. He joined the Roughriders in 1964 after playing just one season with the Saskatoon Junior Hill-tops. His speed and pass-catching ability earned him the starting split end position in 1965 and 1967, during which he caught a total of 37 passes for 1,241 yards. He was shifted to flanker in 1968, but returned to the split end position in 1969. He was the starting flanker in 1970. Gord is 6' and weighs 190 lbs. Gord is manager of Kenridge's Men's Wear in the Northgate Mall. He and his wife, Nancy, have two children.

BRUCE BENNETT—A graduate of Florida University where he obtained his Degree in Physical Education while playing quarterback and safety, Bruce joined the Roughriders in 1966 and has won all-star honors in the Western Football Conference five times as a defensive back. He was named All-Canadian in 1969 when he intercepted eight passes during the regular season. Bruce is 5'10", weighs 180 lbs. and is 28. He is employed by the Royal Bank of Canada. He and his wife Sterling, have three sons.



LARRY BIRD—Originally from Big River, Sask., Larry played two years with the Junior Edmonton Huskies and in 1968 was a Western Inter-Collegiate All-Star with the University of Alberta. In 1969 and 1970, he was also an All-Star in the Eastern Inter-Collegiate Conference with the University of Western Ontario as an offensive guard. In 1971, after five games, Larry took over as first string centre for the Riders. Possessing good quickness and lots of desire, Larry improved as the season progressed. He is 6'1", 225 lbs., and 26 years of age.

GARY BRANDT—A native of Regina, Gary played High School football at Balfour Tech., and then accepted a football scholarship at the University of Washington. After five years in Washington, he acquired excellent blocking techniques as an Offensive Guard plus a Degree in Business Administration. He joined the Roughriders in 1967 and has been a regular guard for the last four years. Gary is 6'1", 230 lbs., and 29 years of age. He and his wife Joan have one son. Gary works with the Budget Bureau of the Saskatchewan Government.



CLYDE BROCK—In his ninth year with the Roughriders, Clyde is the largest and senior member of the offensive line. A four-time All-Canadian offensive tackle, Clyde is a graduate of Utah State University, where he obtained a Degree in Business Administration. Drafted by Chicago Bears in 1962, Clyde subsequently played with Dallas Cowboys and San Francisco 49ers before joining the Roughriders in 1964. He won all-star honors in 1965, his first full season with the Roughriders and has been one of the reasons why the Rider offensive line is feared and highly respected by their opponents throughout the C.F.L. Clyde is 33, 6'5" and weighs 275 lbs. Clyde is assistant Personnel Director with the Regina General Hospital. He and his wife Pat have two children.

TOM CAMPANA—A graduate of Ohio State where he played offensive halfback his sophomore and junior years prior to taking over a regular position in the defensive backfield last year, Tom became one of the best defensive backs in the Big Ten Conference and was selected to play in the Senior Bowl at Mobile. The 5'10", 190-lb. defensive back was drafted 13th by the St. Louis Cardinals. A very versatile player from an exceptional football school, Tom could be a valuable addition to the Rider squad. His home town is Kent, Ohio.





CHARLIE COLLINS—An Eastern Football Conference All-Star with the Grey Cup champion Montreal Alouettes in 1970, Charlie was obtained by the Roughriders in a 1971 pre-season trade that sent Chuck Kyle to Montreal. A graduate of Auburn University, Charlie turned professional with Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League in 1968. He was a final cut at Dallas and reported to Montreal where he became a regular wide linebacker. He won the middle line-backing job in 1970 and played a major part in the Alouettes' Grey Cup victory in Toronto. Charlie is 26, 6'2" and weighs 226 lbs. He plays either wide or middle linebacker and is considered excellent against the pass. He is married and has one daughter.

LEWIS COOK—Lewis is a 6', 185-lb. offensive and defensive half who already had one year's experience in the C.F.L. as a defensive half with Montreal in 1970. He did not play football in 1971 and signed with Saskatchewan for the 1972 season. After two years at Western Arizona Jr. College, Cook played one year as an offensive half and his final year as a defensive corner back with Idaho State at Pocatello. He was named to the Big Sky Conference defensive all-star team. Cook is married.



TED DUSHINSKI—Ted, 26, is another Canadian who made the big step from Junior Football with the Saskatoon Hilltops, directly to professional ranks. He joined the Riders in 1965 and was a regular defensive back when they won the Grey Cup the following year. In 1970, Ted was named to the W.F.C. All-Star team. The 6' 190-lb. back is a very steady performer. Ted is single and employed as a Sales Representative by Rothman's of Canada.



ALAN FORD—In six seasons with the Roughriders, Alan has earned the title of Mr. Versatility in the Canadian Football League. Starting his seventh year of professional football, Alan has played at least a half dozen different positions and has more than filled the bill each time. In addition to handling the Roughriders' punting chores, he has played split end, tight end, half-back, cornerback, defensive halfback and flanker on occasions. Alan, 28, 6'1", 195 lbs., accepted a basketball scholarship at University of the Pacific, but turned to football to assume punting chores and defensive back duties. Holding a Degree in Physical Education, Al is a teacher at Thom Collegiate. His hobby is working with boys. Alan and his wife, Sally, have two children, a son and a daughter.



RALPH GALLOWAY—Heading into his fourth season with the Roughriders, Ralph joined the Club mid-way through the 1969 season and has been the starting left offensive tackle. Drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals of the National Football League after an outstanding career as an offensive guard at Southern Illinois University in 1968, Ralph was a late cut and finished that season with Charleston of the Continental League. He returned to the Cardinal camp in 1969 and was recommended to the Roughriders after being the final cut that year by St. Louis. Ralph, 25, is 6' and weighs 255 lbs. He has excellent speed and is a tough blocker.



BOB KOSIO—Bob set a new all-time record with a career total of 28 pass interceptions in regular season play by the end of the 1970 season. He was sidelined late last season with a torn achilles tendon which required surgery. Born in Brandon, Bob played High School football in Chicago and was a three-year letterman at the University of Kentucky, where he obtained a Degree in Economics. He was named All-Canadian in 1969. Bob, 30, is 5'10" and weighs 185 lbs. A Sales Representative for I.B.M., Bob and his wife Pat, have one son and a daughter.



RON LANCASTER—The 33-year-old G.B. is a C.F.L. record holder in the following categories:

Ron is starting his 10th season with Saskatchewan after two years with Ottawa. He was named All-Canadian G.B. in 1970, and won the Schenley Award as Canada's outstanding player that same year. Ron is 5'10" and 185 lbs. He has good quickness, is a smart signal caller and an excellent team leader. Ron and his wife Bev., have three children. He is employed as Athletic Director at Central Collegiate in Regina.



BILL MANCHUK—After spending one year at Idaho State in Pocatello, this Edmonton native enrolled at the University of Alberta in his home town to complete his Degree. He was drafted No. 2 by Saskatchewan in the '71 Canadian College Draft and proved to be a good addition to the team as a back-up receiver and linebacker, on defense. Bill is 24, 6'3" and 210 lbs. He is married and returned to Edmonton in the off-season.



ARCHIE McCORD—Archie played High School football in his native city of Moose Jaw. He attended Simon Fraser for one year and then transferred to the University of North Dakota where he lettered for two years as a defensive tackle. Last year, Archie joined the Riders, but broke a bone in his wrist and did not see action all year. He is 6'1", 230 lbs., and will be trying for an offensive guard or defensive lineman position with the team in 1972. Archie returned to University to complete his Masters in Physical Education. He was married in early spring of this year.



ED. McQUARTERS—A six-year veteran defensive tackle Ed has won All-Canadian honours three times and in 1967 won the Schenley Award as the C.F.L.'s outstanding lineman. A graduate of the University of Oklahoma, Ed was a late cut of the St. Louis Cardinals in 1966 and joined the Roughriders that season. He was a key figure in the Roughriders' march to the 1966 Grey Cup and has continued to turn in an outstanding performance game after game. A home workshop accident in which he lost his left eye, kept Ed out of action for the first half of the 1971 season, but he returned to the lineup in the 7th regular season game to strengthen the defensive line. Ed and his wife Bunny have two sons. He is employed as a Public Relations Officer with the Saskatchewan Power Corporation.





STEVE MOLNAR—Steve is another of the valuable Canadian players on the Roughrider roster. In his fourth season with the club, Steve has seen considerable playing time as a fullback and halfback. A native of Saskatoon, Steve was awarded a football scholarship at George Washington University in 1965. When the University dropped football, Steve transferred to Utah University where he was the regular fullback for two years. Steve is 25 is 5'11" and weighs 195 lbs. He spent the off season working towards his Degree in Engineering at Utah University. He and his wife Joanne have a daughter.

BOB PEARCE—Bob was a running back his sophomore year and Quarterback his Junior and Senior years at Stephen F. Austin College in Texas. He was drafted as a defensive back and cut by the Minnesota Vikings in 1970. He joined the Riders for their 11th game in the 1970 season and immediately became a fan favourite playing either defensive back or running back. Last year he broke a bone in his leg and was sidelined for the last half of the season. He will be trying out as a Quarterback at this year's camp. Bob is 24, 5'10" and 180 lbs. A very exciting runner and pass receiver, his versatility will guarantee a spot on the Roughrider regular roster.



ROCK PERDONI—An all-American defensive tackle at Georgia Tech in 1970, Rock signed with Hamilton T-Cats last year. In mid-season of '71 he was traded to Winnipeg. In the off season, Edmonton acquired Perdoni and he was a regular defensive tackle with the Eskimos in their early '72 league games. When Greg Pipes recovered from an injury, Rock was placed on waivers by Edmonton. Due to an injury to Ed McGuffee, Saskatchewan had an opening for a defensive tackle and were fortunate to be able to add him to the roster. The 5'11", 240-lb. Perdoni has proved a fine addition to the Riders in the latter games of the '72 season and in the W.F.C. playoffs. Rock's home is Wellesley, Mass.



ROB PYNE—Rob was born in Regina and is a son of Wayne Pyne, a former Roughrider player. He spent one year at Tulsa University before returning to play three years with the Regina Rams. A Man-Sask. Junior League All-Star for three years, Rob was also named most outstanding player on the Rams in 1971 and won the trophy as the most valuable player in the Man-Sask. League. At 6'2" and 200 lbs., Rob has the stature to be a good defensive halfback in the C.F.L.



GEORGE REED—A 6' 205-lb. fullback, George is the most consistent rusher in the history of the Canadian Football League. Every time he carries the ball he establishes a new record. The C.F.L. records presently held by Reed are:

JOHN REID—After three years with the Hamilton T-Cats, John joined the Roughriders this year in a trade which should bolster the centre of the Roughrider offensive line. At 6'4" and 255 lbs., the 27-year-old Reid gives the Roughriders a big experienced centre who can snap the long ball for field goals and punts. John is married and a graduate of Tulsa University, where he received a football scholarship after a fine High School career in Hamilton.



ROY ROBINSON—Roy was one of the key players with Montana University's undefeated team in 1969. The 5'10" 180-lb. defensive back twice was named to the Big Sky Conference All-Star team. He was also Conference sprint champion his senior year, being timed on the 100 yards at 9.4. In addition to possessing great quickness, Roy is a fine tackler. He was a ninth draft choice of Atlanta in the 1971 College Draft. He is married and now calls Missoula, Montana, his home town.



TIM ROTH—A 6'2", 250-lb. defensive lineman, Tim was nicknamed the "Big Cat" at South Dakota State. He was their outstanding defensive player for two years as a defensive tackle and his senior year as a defensive end. Roth was drafted 16th by Oakland in 1970. In last year's training camp he displayed the strength and quickness to become a fixture in the C.F.L. and won a regular position as left defensive end. A native of Madison, Wisconsin, Tim majored in Economics at University.



WAYNE SHAW—Heading into his 12th season with the Roughriders, Wayne is the veteran of the team in terms of service. Wayne, 33, is 6' and weighs 224 lbs. A graduate of the Saskatchewan Hilltops, Wayne is a five-time Western Football Conference All-Star linebacker, and in 1968 was named the most valuable Canadian on the Riders roster. An excellent tackler with good speed, Wayne is another reason why it has been difficult for teams to run wide against the Roughriders. A resident of Regina, Wayne is a partner in Indequia Sales Ltd., and a Division Manager.



DON SEAMAN—Rated as the finest player to ever wear a uniform with the Saskatoon Hilltops of the Man-Sask. Junior Football League, Don won all-star honors in each of his four seasons with the club. He also was a two-time winner of the Bert Ole trophy, awarded annually to the league's most valuable lineman. He joined the Riders in 1969, and has been a member of special teams for the past three years. An excellent tackler, he is usually the first man downfield on punts. Another of the eligible bachelors on the club, Don is 25, 6'1" and weighs 222 lbs.

JOHN STEELE—A graduate of Simon Fraser University, John was the Roughriders' third round choice in the 1971 College Draft. This 6'1" 209-lb. defensive back saw considerable action last year after Bob Pearce and Bob Kosid were sidelined by injuries. John also is a place kicker and served as a back-up to Jack Abendschan last year. He is single and he returned to his home in Vancouver during the off-season.



STEVE SVITAX—A 6'1", 235-lb. linebacker from Boise State. He was drafted by Oakland in 1970 but failed to make the Raiders roster. In 1971 he signed with Houston Oilers, was traded to Buffalo and remained with that club until released in mid-August of this year. Although bothered with knee and ankle injuries since joining the Roughriders, Steve has proven to be a fine middle linebacker with all kinds of desire. Steve is married.

BOBBY THOMPSON—One of the most dangerous deep receivers in the W.F.C. In 1969, his rookie year, Bobby caught 45 passes for 891 yards and an average gain of 19.8 yards per reception. He missed most of the 1970 season when he suffered a knee injury which required surgery. Though still bothered in the 1971 training camp, Bobby played every game last year and gradually strengthened his knee to the point where he should be 100% again in 1972. An All-American Junior College halfback at Western Arizona in 1967, Bobby transferred to Oklahoma University in 1968 and still spends the off-season furthering his education at that university. Married, Bobby is 24, 5'11" and weighs 183 lbs.



JIM WALTER—A native of Montreal, Jim's parents are both Saskatchewan natives. He is 29, 5'10", weighs 190 lbs. and joined the Roughriders after the start of the 1970 season. He was obtained from the Montreal Alouettes after duty with both the Alouettes and Toronto Argonauts. A graduate of Tulsa University, Jim picked up four years of experience as a defensive back in the Eastern Conference before coming west. In addition to earning the starting right defensive halfback job with the Riders, Jim handled the punt return chores for the past two years. In 1970, with an average return of 8.1 yards, he was tops in the W.F.C.

BUBBA WYCHE—A graduate of Tennessee University where he quarterbacked the Vols to a 8-1-1 record in 1968, his senior year. Bubba was the Roughrider back-up quarterback in 1969 and again in 1971. He sat out the 1970 season. He is 25 years of age, 6' and 185 lbs., and possesses the quickness and all-round ability to step in and perform well should the opportunity arise. In 1971 with very limited playing time he completed 25 passes in 58 attempts for 368 yards.
