

TIGERS DEFEATED THE EDMONTON Y.M.C.A. IN A SORROWFUL MANNER

Just a Little Score of 31 to 0 Piled Up by Local Team

TIGERS WERE IN THE BEST FORM

Some Excellent Runs, and the Players Excelled in Good Playing

Although the weather was well below freezing, one of the largest crowds that has witnessed any big four game turned out to see the Tiger-Y.M.C.A. game, and though the score was 31 to 0 in favor of the Tigers, it does not represent the class of rugby played by the Edmonton boys.

Wark Plays Star Game.

Arnold Wark, the Tiger halfback, was the star performer all through the first half, and was certainly not in the back ground during the second. Twice he made runs of nearly 50 yards, running through the whole Y.M.C.A. team with ease. His punting showed up well and went to make many gains for the Tigers.

Dobbie, the Tiger centre half, played a star game and his long well-placed punts during the last half ran up the score of 21 to 0. During the first five minutes of the game McLean got the ball on a fumble and before the Y.M.C.A. boys realized it, he was on his way down the field. He started at the half line with May at his heels and the whole Y.M.C.A. team following. Although his speed was not great the Y.M.C.A. team impeded each other and he got over the line for a touchdown.

Parney, the much advertised Edmonton sprinter, who was billed to do a star performance, made one short run and was not heard from during the rest of the game. This will be sad news to many of the cognizants from Edmonton, who depended upon Parney's great sprinting powers to win the game.

Tigers in Great Form.

Although the score was large the Y.M.C.A. put up a creditable showing but the Tigers were at perfection and showed that they were in another class. The Tiger scrimmage went through the Y.M.C.A. line nearly every time and although Atwell, the Edmonton heavyweight, was playing centre, he could not stop them.

The Johnston-Woods and Robertson combination seemed to be too well organized for the opposing forwards to break through, and held the line on every down.

Walter Ross, the Tiger captain, played a steady, sure game and did not let anything by. Ross played centre half during the first half and moved to quarter in the second.

The whole Tiger team worked together in fine style and perhaps never showed better team work than in this game.

First Quarter.

The Tigers kicked off and Barnes returned. The Tigers went down on the Y.M.C.A. 25-yard line. Edmonton lost 10 yards on an off-side and the Tigers went down again, this time Wark making a short run. Edmonton got the ball and tried to hulk, but the heavy Tiger scrimmage pushed them back onto their own ground. The Tigers lost five yards on an off-side and Bill, the Edmonton half, made a nice run. A long pass gave Parney an opportunity for a run around the end, but he was tackled and lost five yards. The Y.M.C.A. went down and a fumble occurred. In the mix-up that followed, McLean got the ball and drew first blood for the Tigers with a touchdown. Paddy Johnson tried to convert this from a difficult angle but failed. On the next Edmonton down they lost five yards. At this juncture the Edmonton fullback caught the ball and found to his dismay that it was punctured. A new ball was secured and May made a 10-yard run and fell into the arms of Dobbie. On the next down Edmonton made a prolonged fumble, the ball passed from man

to man, each missing it, and at last was down for a loss of ten yards.

On the next down Wark got a long pass and made a run to the Y.M.C.A. line from centre field.

Second Quarter.

During the first part of the next quarter Wark made the Y.M.C.A. rue and following this Ross kicked a dead line. Later in the quarter the Tigers got a drop over goal and after this another touch, which was converted. A run and a dead line made the score 19 to 0 at half time.

Third Quarter.

Edmonton took the hind and moved up to the Tiger line. They were, however, forced back and a run was the result. Shortly after this the Tigers got another touch and at the end of the third quarter the score was 25 to 0.

Last Quarter.

In the last quarter the Y.M.C.A. showed signs of bucking up but were forced back to their line by Dobbie's long punts and were kept there by that same individual. While they were back on their line Dobbie was piling up the score with runs and dead lines and when the whistle went at full time the score stood 31 to 0 in favor of the Tigers.

The Officials.

The Rev. Bob Pearson of Edmonton and Bull Ritchie officiated and no fault could be found with their decisions. It was remarked that even certain parties in Edmonton could not find fault with this combination.

The Tigers showed fine team work and if they play like this against the Eskimos they will have no trouble in winning. They made practically no fumbles and all the plays were worked briskly and cleanly.
