The Torontos lost fairly, the Alerts won fairly. True, some will blame Everett Smith for part of the defeat, but acidents will happen and had not a sudden gust of wind caught the bail and carried it against the goalpost, Reg DeGrouchy, to whom the ball was passed, would have been able to secure it and make a getaway instead of Flannery falling on it for the first try of the game. Smith showthe first try of the game. Smith showed discretion, but the chances were good and he took them. With this one exception Torontos played heady rugby and the fact that they scored three points in their last quarter, showed that till the final whistle blew they were an aggregation to be reck-oned with.

Those who thought to see a "rough house" game were disappointed.
