

## SAINTS PUT UP GAME BATTLE BUT PARKDALE EASILY WON IN ONTARIO RUGBY UNION MATCH

St. Brigid's Were Without Charlie Connell in Holiday Fixture at Toronto, and Could Not Cope With Trick Plays and Speed of New Champions, Being Beaten by Score of 32 to 4. Fumbles Behind St. Brigid's Line at Critical Moments Proved Costly.

TORONTO, Nov. 7. — Parkdale Cane Club finished their senior O.R.F.U. schedule today by defeating the Ottawa St. Brigid's by a score of 32 to 4, and thus won the senior championship of the Ontario Union with four victories and no defeats.

While the score was one-sided, the game was very interesting, inasmuch as the winners gave an exhibition of the open game, which is made possible by the new rules introduced this season. In Breen, Munroe and Goddard the Paddlers have a trio of speedy halves and much of their attack is developed around these three. Wendell Holmes was played at flying wing and Douglas replaced Eddie Rodden at quarter. The winners used line plunges at times but the majority of their plays were runs and the back-field players showed a distinct understanding of each other, and the way that the three halves and Holmes worked on combination runs was a treat for the 3,000 fans that attended the game.

Parkdale scored a touch thirty seconds from the commencement of the game and gradually increased their lead until the first quarter score was 17 to 0. This early lead and the superiority of the Paddlers left no doubt as to the final result, but the crowd stayed until the final whistle, which shows plainly that the spectators prefer the open game to the other kind and they certainly were given a pretty demonstration of what is possible under the new rules.

The Saints were weaker than expected, but no doubt the absence of Charlie Connell from the back division had a lot to do with this. Joe Miller was moved up from the half line to quarter and he was the star for the losers. Although only a small player, he proved to be a very tricky runner, but he used himself in the plays too often and the Paddlers had to but watch him and they solved the visitors' attack. Touhey did the kicking for the Saints, but did not get much distance into his punts. He was not in the best of condition owing to a previous injury. Both Miller and Touhey fumbled, and several of these were turned into tries by the Paddlers, who were down on every kick. Shaw and Clancy were fairly strong on the back division, while Parmelee, Flanagan and Timmis were good on smashes at the Parkdale line, and it was largely due to their work that on two different occasions during the game the Saints swept the Paddlers before them for gains of nearly fifty yards. The losers did not possess the tackling ability of the Paddlers and at times showed that they were a little doubtful as to the plays.

In the first period Parkdale secured a try inside of a minute. Breen kicked off to Touhey, who returned to Holmes. The latter booted back again and on a fumble Moore dribbled the ball over the line and fell on it for a touch. Douglas added another point when his upside kick went for a touch in goal. The champions kept on the offensive and soon Parnell was shoved over for a try. With St. Brigid's in possession near their own goal, Touhey's kick was blocked and Douglas fell on it for a try, giving Parkdale the lead by 17 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

The visitors showed their best defence in the second quarter and during the fifteen minutes outscored the locals three points to 1. St.

Brigid's assumed an offensive which took the ball into Parkdale territory and Touhey dropped a pretty field goal from thirty yards out.

With the wind at their backs in the third period the Paddlers added fourteen additional points. After they had obtained a rouse the Saints smashed their way up the field, making yards four times in succession, but were finally forced to kick and the Breen-Munroe-Holmes combination soon carried the ball back past centre field. Breen finally kicked over to Miller, who fumbled and Harris fell on the ball for another try. Shortly afterwards a long pass from Miller went astray and Touhey was downed behind his line for a safety touch. The Saints then tried an end run, but Clancy fumbled the pass and Breen, grabbing the ball, rounded the field for a try.
