

Leadley and Timmins Star When Hamilton Tigers Trim Queen's

Bengal Squad Cop. Rugby Championship of Eastern Canada With 14-3 Triumph; Leadley Scores a Touchdown and Kicks a couple of Field Goals

KINGSTON, Ont., Nov. 25.—Hamilton Tigers annexed the rugby football championship of Eastern Canada here on Saturday afternoon when they defeated Queens by the score of 14-3 and thereby qualified to meet Regina Roughriders for the Canadian title. There was never a doubt throughout the game as to the Tigers being the better team, for they flashed superiority from the start, matched the tri-color in their strongest points, those of kicking and tackling, and conducted a plunging parade that gave them yards 17 times during the game.

Tigers were the all-round better team, but it remained for one of the veterans, "Pep" Leadley, former star of the Tri-color, to dominate the play and monopolize the limelight by scoring 11 of his team's points.

Leadley was the same old Leadley of yore. He plunged consistently for gains, ran 30 yards for a touchdown and kicked two field goals on the gridiron, where he first rode to fame in rugby, and where his greatest laurels were gained.

But quit apart from the fine performance by Leadley, the Tigers were the better team. Brian Timmins, their herculean middle-wing, time after time smashed gaping holes in the Queen's line for gains, and capped his performance by breaking away for a 30-yard run, which ended with Welch kicking the last point of the game. Timmins, Bondway, Elford and Leadley could not be stopped, and the smart way in which they got their plays going, gave them an early advantage, which they maintained throughout, with the exception of a short time in the last quarter.

Queen's played good football, good enough to beat the average team, and it was not because of breaks that the Tigers won. They were simply the better team. Carter kicked well for the tri-color. But it seemed as though Queen's made a mistake in continually trying to break through the stonewall defence of the Bengals. Had they kicked more on the first down, they might have secured better results. But, on the other hand, the steady work of the Tigers' backfield stood out, and even in a strictly aerial attack, they probably would have wound up with much the same result.

How They Scored

Tigers scored the only point of the first quarter when Welch kicked to the deadline. Early in the second quarter Leadley kicked a field goal to make the count 4-0. Leadley repeated the feat early in the third quarter to make it 7-0. Welch made it 8-0 when he kicked to Gilmore for a rouge. Leadley made a great end run for a touchdown and it was 13-0 at the end of the quarter.

Carter scored Queen's first point early in the final quarter, when he kicked to Gibb and Gourley rouged him. Queen's got their second point when Gilmore kicked to Welch and the latter was rouged. Carter added Queen's third point on a kick to the deadline. Welch kicked for Tigers' last point just before full time.
