

## BALMY BEACH BEATS SENATORS AS RUGBY SEASON IS OPENED

Ottawa Defence Crumbles in  
Last Quarter and Beachers  
Triumph, 13-1

KEHOE SHOWS UP WELL

Kicks and Carries Ball Bril-  
liantly for Ottawa Twelve  
—Fister and Smith  
Score Tries

Toronto, September 22.—A crum-  
bling Ottawa defence allowed Balmy  
Beach to roll up the last-quarter  
touchdown and score an impres-  
sive 13 to 1 victory at Varsity  
stadium here Saturday afternoon in  
an exhibition rugby game that  
marked the opening of the 1929 sea-  
son.

For three-quarters the Rough  
Riders from the East fought dog-  
gedly against the battering of the  
heavy O. R. F. U. team and then  
collapsed. Going into the final  
period, the Interprovincial Union  
team trailed by a small 3-1 margin.  
They had opened the scoring in the  
first quarter when Beachy was  
downed behind his line after receiv-  
ing Kehoe's kick, but the great ad-  
vantage wiped out when Claude  
Harris dropped a field goal from the  
12-yard line for three points.

Throughout the second and third  
periods the Ottawa team held its  
own. The battering drives of the  
Beach heavies were offset by the  
licking and smart broken-field run-  
ning of Kehoe, on the Ottawa half  
line, and occasional expression runs  
that featured Kehoe and Ogilvie.

It was a third Ottawa team that  
began the final quarter. Gaping holes  
were torn in the Rough Riders' front  
line as the Balmy Beach "tanks"  
ploughed through. Amer, Foster and  
Crowhurst ran wild as their heavy  
front division showed the way. Five,  
twenty-five and fifteen-yard gains  
were reeled off in successive downs.

And then the Ottawa defence stiff-  
ened. Cunningham was halted inside  
the five-yard line, with two yards to  
go; Hughes charged into a stubborn  
Ottawa line and fumbled. Four  
Rough Riders pounced on the ball.  
In the very shadow of their goal,  
Ottawa elected to back rather than  
kick. The first attempt failed and  
then Ketchum swept through for  
eight yards to his 16-yard line. Ogil-  
vie ran into the Beach defence wall  
and failed to make yards. Patten  
charged through and was brought  
down inside the five-yard line. Fister  
was chosen for the Beachers' at-  
tempt and his first effort failed, but  
on the final down he flung himself  
over the line for a touch. For a few  
minutes further damage was staved  
off, mainly because of Kehoe's kick-  
ing and dodging runs. But the Beach  
machine rolled slowly onward, and  
from the 85-yard line Jack Smith  
skipped the full end and galloped  
across for the final touch. Neither  
of the major scores was converted by  
Hushee.

**OTTAWA UNLEASHES ATTACK.**  
In the last five minutes of play  
Ottawa unleashed a surprise offensive  
that caught the confident Beachers  
napping. Kehoe and Ogilvie teamed up  
on extension runs, while the former's  
booting outdistanced that of Hughes.  
Kehoe climaxed his brilliant all-round  
work with a 13-yard open field spring  
to the Balmy Beach seven-yard line.  
Patterson failed, and as a last resort  
Hutchingson fell back for a drop-  
kick, but his hurried effort was partly  
blocked and bounded into the charging  
line.

The game provided a pleasing  
season opener for the 1,000 fans  
present and an excellent conditioner  
for both teams. Many rough edges  
need touching up. Ottawa refused  
to more extension play than the  
Beachers, but only at times were  
they sent away in good working  
order. Their line plunging failed to  
equal that of the Toronto team, but  
the weight handicap was against the  
visitors. The Beachers presented a  
well-balanced squad, but the kicking  
of Robertson, Delaney and Hughes  
failed to measure up to Kehoe's lift.  
The host O.R.F.U. entry relies great-  
ly on its tonnage.

Kehoe was the outstanding player  
for the visitors Saturday, while Fister,  
Crowhurst and Harris were promi-  
nent for the winners.  
Two minor fistic affairs brought  
about the postponement of Taylor, Fun-  
ton and Dunn. The last two staged  
a wide open sparring match late in  
the final period.
