

# Eskimos Whitewashed Deacon White's Gridders Register Impressive Win Over Student Aggregation

Green and Gold Squad, Minus Four Stars Through Injuries, Were Unable to Hold Igloo Dwellers Except in Final Quarter

Displaying marked superiority in every department over a game but outclassed squad from the University of Alberta, Deacon White's Eskimos registered an impressive 18-0 victory in the opening match of the Alberta Rugby union schedule at Benzie park on Saturday afternoon. The White coached machine, except at odd intervals, had Dr. Bud Morgan's warriors from the halls of learning almost continuously on the defensive. The igloo dwellers repeatedly smashed through the green and gold line for substantial gains and also ran the ends with great success, but possibly the most pleasing thing to the Eskimo coach and supporters of the squad was the excellent manner in which the winners turned to account the forward pass, a weapon which proved practically useless as a ground gainer against the famous Hamilton Tigers here last Wednesday. Time after time, Cliff Shuttleworth heaved the oval to a waiting team mate for completed gains of 15, 20 and 25 yards and this was one of the biggest factors in the victory of the Eks. It is true that a few of the passes went astray and that Varsity players also intercepted others but the great majority were completed for large gains—ample justification for the pains-taking care that the Eks have taken to perfect this new offensive weapon of Canadian football.

**Varsity Minus Five Stars**  
Minus the services of four veteran stars, who suffered injuries during the early training period, and with new and untried material in both his line and backfield, Coach Dr. Morgan's university stalwarts nevertheless put up a fight, characteristic of green and gold grid squads of former seasons but a longer period of training and more experience on the part of their opponents told heavily against the rah rah gang.

Memmes, Shandro, Cook, Thompson and Pullaby, five veteran stars of the student machine were unable to play, owing to injuries and this quartet were missed and badly missed by the U. of A. Several promising newcomers appeared in the lineup of the losers, however, and once the squad is back to full strength it will be a different looking team.

**Eks Looked Good**  
The line of the Eskimos, which showed much promise against the dominion champions, was again strong as the Rock of Gibraltar, while the backfield functioned smoothly along throughout. "Catsy" Mills, Ken McConnell, Nels Nelson, Bud Williamson and Joe Dwyer, shone brilliantly in a sturdy Eskimo line, while Cliff Shuttleworth, Eric Duggan and Elwyn Jones twinkled brightly in the backfield for the winners. Shuttleworth and Williamson stood out prominently with several brilliantly executed forward passing plays that were completed for big gains while Jones again stood out in the deep backfield with his catching of punts and his kicking. The little Wehman didn't have the success with his drop kicks that he usually has, several of his hoists going wide of the uprights but the ones he missed invariably rolled to the line for single points.

Al Hall, who played flying wing, Mickey Timothy, midget backfield star, Reg. Moir, McLennan and Burke played well for students.

**The First Quarter**  
Varsity kicked off in the first quarter and Campbell passed to Shuttleworth who made ten yards; Varsity held the Eks on a line buck but the Green and Gold crew were unable to make any advance and Hall punted to Duggan. The Eks completed their first of several forward passes when

Shuttleworth heaved to Williamson for 15 yards. Mills plunged for five and another completed forward pass; Shuttleworth to Williamson brought the Eks to Varsity's 40-yard line from which position, Jones sent over a beautiful drop-kick for the first three Eskimo points.

The Eks continued to press and Williamson intercepted a Varsity forward pass and ran the ball back 20 yards. An attempted drop kick by Jones was wide and the oval rolled to the line for a point. Duggan and McConnell each made yards on successive plunges and the Eks bagged their fifth and sixth points of the quarter when two more attempted field goals by Jones missed and the ball crossed the line in each instance.

**Second Quarter**  
The Eks continued to harass the opposition in the second quarter, the students having no defence against the repeated forward passing of the igloo dwellers. Clarence Campbell scooped up the oval and dashed over for the first touchdown of the game late in the period when Moir fumbled a kick from Duggan. It was not converted. Moir was routed by Campbell for the Eks' twelfth marker and Carver's long hoist went for a touch in goal to complete the scoring for the session and make the count 12-0.

Duggan's touchdown was the only scoring in the third, Jones missing in the convert.

In the final canto, the Varsity opposition stiffened and there was no scoring. Mickey Timothy made several gains for the students in this quarter.
