

BENGALS ARE DEFEATED IN FINAL CLASH

Calgarians Give Western
Champs Real Battle
But Lose, 9-6

CALGARY, Nov. 11.—Alberta came very, very close to visiting British Columbia for the Western Canada football title this week. A mere three points separated Calgary's fighting Tigers from Regina Roughriders when the final whistle tooted here yesterday afternoon the Ritchie men from Saskatchewan plugging away in the final quarter to break a 5-6 deadback in hint of three hard-earned rugers 1 with 9-6.

Looking like total strangers from the mediocre squad that managed to capture the Alberta gouldian, Wall Sterlings' Bengals fought like men against the famed many-time Western champions, overcame a 4-lead in the second quarter when Mo Kinnon placed a perfect onside kick to Ralph Johnson two yards from the Regina line which the feet ball-carried over for a touchdown, then covered and generally had the heavily backed Reginsians in precarious position frequently during the afternoon.

When it came to Bar-plunging and skirting the ends the Tigers weren't in it with the muscle-men from the Queen City, gaining yards only four times, once on a forward pass, while the invaders crashed their first-down totals to 17. Each team completed a forward pass, Calgary attempting seven and Regina

It was only by the timely punting of Neil Bloomfield and the deadly tackling to follow it up that the visitors went on to the coast. Des Grub counted a placement kick in the first quarter and Bloomfield kicked the rest with the aid of heavy tackling for rangers. Bob Hall kept his team in the hunt by returning Bloomfield's punts frequently and kicking consistently well when in a tight spot. Regina, although they displayed great punting ability in "Red" Currie, "Bert" Myers and Al Urness, and sensational punners engineered by Grubb, Mitchell and Bloomfield, failed in their

Roughriders were penalized 10 yards and five minutes compared to Tigers' lone ten-yard setback for offside in the final three minutes of play, and that had something to do with their failure to score. Ferguson, Calgary head lineman, had his weather eye out for the gridders from the scorching furnace.
