

Imperials In 37-0 Victory

St. Mike's Outclassed

SARNIA, Oct. 31.—Fearfullest there should be any mistake about it, Sarnia Imperials piled up 37 points against St. Michael's College here Saturday afternoon to cinch their second senior O.R.F.U. championship in consecutive years. St. Mike's failed to score a point.

CAN'T STOP THEM

They were outwheeled, outkicked, outguessed and gallantly as they strove it was to no avail against their more seasoned opponents. On the football the Imperials are playing it is doubtful if any team in Canada can stop them, and that without Parnace and Malloy, their American stars.

St. Mike's, except for part of the first period when they fought back spiritedly after having a major score against them in the first three minutes, were quite out of their class. Both teams were a little afraid of the mud in the first period, but after all players began to look alike Sarnia found their feet, and points came so fast at times they had the 2,000 spectators bewildered. The home team was never threatened.

A fumble after three minutes' play in the first was scooped up by Perry on St. Mike's 25-yard line, and the Sarnia flash passed to Brown, who handed it on to Stirling for the touchdown. This was converted for the only score of the first period. Stirling kicked four points in the second, and Perry notched a touchdown after a long run. Hayes kicked a field goal and added another point with a rouse.

MANORE AT QUARTER

When Hayes was hurt in the third, Manore took over at quarter and initiated a series of brilliant end runs. He, with Perry and Stirling, carried the ball to St. Mike's five-yard line, and Fraser went through for the touchdown. A few minutes later Manore carried the ball with a sensational 40-yard run, and when almost on the line he passed to Perry, who carried it over, and Brown converted. Hardly had the echo of the whistle died away when Brown intercepted a St. Mike's forward pass and ran clean through the St. Mike's team for another touchdown, and this, too, was converted.

In the last period Schmidt, who had taken over the kicking from Connolly, almost outdistanced Stirling. St. Mike's were still fighting, and they held their big opponents down to one point.

Perry, Manore, Brown and Fraser led the stellar Imperials to their biggest victory of the year. For St. Mike's Schmidt and Mark were clever and effective, but generally speaking the visitors were everywhere overshadowed.
