

# Lady Luck, Forward Passes Nearly Too Much for 'Minsters

Victoria Uncovered Aerial Attack That Had New Westminster Dizzy

Viva Le Trasolini, hail Bill Henderson and three cheers for Jackie May.

They combined to turn what looked like a sure defeat for New Westminster into a victory in the dying moments of their game with Victoria Gridders at Athletic Park last night.

Trasolini (better known for his baseball with Firemen) and May carried the ball around the ends, through the line, in and out of players from their own 15-yard line to Victoria's 20. It's true they were stopped momentarily while Victoria had possession but as soon as the Islanders fumbled and lost the ball these two Royalties continued their progressive march.

After they reached the opposition's 20-yard line, Bill Henderson, who in the first half of the game was all New Westminster had in the form of attack, ripped the line wide open, carried himself, two Victoria players and the ball 20 yards for a touchdown.

Up till this time Victoria was leading 10-2; two touchdowns (unconverted) against two deadline kicks, both by Trasolini.

The Islanders were also ahead in the two-games-total-points-to-count series 11-8, the first game having gone to New Westminster 6-1.

So Bill Henderson's plunge put them in the lead 13-11 and when they completed a forward pass for the extra point, they were sitting pretty.

## LAST BREATH

With three minutes to go, Victoria made a strong bid to carry the ball over New Westminster's line on two fake passes. They gained 35 yards. Forward pass, netted another 15 yards, but time was called before they got in scoring position.

Plenty of kicking forward passes and open field running made the game pleasing to watch as did the Hudson's Bay half time game of two teams dressed in women's clothing between the daisies and panties.

Vancouver Sun's boys' band was on hand, adding a musical touch to the whole thing.

Victoria introduced an aerial attack which combined with a couple of breaks, some smart line work and good kicking promised to give them the game in a walk.

Their first play of the game was a 35-yard pass from their own 45-yard line thrown by Gribble to McGinnis. Another was tried, missed and a kick put New Westminster on their own goal line. On their first play, Sammy Alvaroz proceeded to fumble. Victoria recovered and went over the line on the third down, Gribble carrying. It was not converted.

New Westminster came to life momentarily after this touch when Bill Henderson knocked the Islanders aside like paper dolls to make 25 yards on bucks but when they got in a position to kick for one point over the deadline they tried a drop kick and lost the ball.

A fifteen-yard end run and another complete forward pass from Gribble to McGinnis put Victoria in a good position again. Lady Luck donned a uniform for the Islanders here and Max McDonald missed a catch on a kick. Victoria wasted no time pouncing on the ball and carried it over the line on the second play for another touch that was unconverted.

## TRASOLINI SCORES

Trasolini came to the fore here with smart kicking gaining yards for

his team to eventually kick two over the deadline, one of which went into what used to be Hanbury's mill. In the second half both teams looked off color, the backs having a tough time receiving kicks.

Victoria continued their policy of throwing forward passes at the most unexpected times, Gribble and Imrie heaving them around like they were baseballs.

Bill Henderson in the second half was mobbed every time he made a move and took a terrific beating. But when the time came to cash in, he was there.

New Westminster's line wasn't functioning quite right the whole game. They made the holes but didn't keep them open long enough and Victoria linemen who, at their worst were deadlier than Fly Tons to that same insect smeared most of the Queen City plays.

## FUMBLES COSTLY

Victoria had a tricky set of plays that gave the winners no end of trouble and their linemen at times opened holes as big as the Colorado Canyon for the buckers. But Victoria and 'Minster for that matter couldn't take advantage of their opportunities, usually fumbling when harvest time drew near.

Woods and McGinnis, ends for the Islanders, rate as high as any pair of ends in the league and Bobby Bourne in the same position for the winners did nicely.

Trasolini displayed some nice forward passing as well as kicking and running. The game was featured by forward passes. Victoria attempted 14 and completed four while New Westminster got one out of eight but would have had a couple more only for fumbles.

Winners had nine first downs and the losers seven.

So now New Westminster plays the winner of Merabona-V.A.C. series to see who meets the prairies on the way to the Dominion championships.

## Carahan Queen Is Boss At Toronto

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—When horses journey east after campaigning on Western Canada tracks throughout the summer, the eastern betting public don't seem to think much of them. Duchess of York, owned by K. Inamasu, aged but still flashy, was the first one to confound eastern experts. She defeated a classy field of Canadian bred, at odds of 9-1.

After being out twice at Woodbine without showing much, Carahan Queen by Nepperhan out of Carabosse, and owned and trained by C. T. Leavitt, was placed in the field with Sir Michael and Baunboy, and defeated high rated Canadian bred over the mile and 70-yard route. The field paid off at 13 to 1. Carahan's time was 1.44 2-5.

## Foreman Folds Up Under Punishment

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.—Youth, aggressiveness and ability to punch hard, won for Joe Ghazouly, St. Louis lightweight, a technical knockout victory over Al Foreman.
