

GERLITZ PACES EDMONTON TO 14 TO 5 VICTORY OVER CALGARY'S 'B' SQUAD AT MEWATA STADIUM

Hi-Grads Take Advantage of Calgary Mis-Plays to End This City's Eight-Year Supremacy Over Edmonton in Senior Grid Sport

Calgary's reign over Edmonton in senior rugby, which existed since 1928, was broken at the Stadium Saturday afternoon, when the largest crowd of the season saw the capital city Hi-Grads outscore Calgary Bronks "B" squad 14 to 5 in a highly interesting Alberta Rugby Union contest. The northerners rode to their triumph through the ability to take advantage of their opponents' fumbles, three of them paying the way for all 14 points registered by the Hi-Grads.

Despite a light breeze, weather conditions were ideal and notwithstanding the fact that the locals went down to defeat, the fans seemed to enjoy the wide open display of rugby.

Big Ed Rorvig, of the senior squad, who was unable to make the trip to Regina with Carl Cronina "A" squad, hurriedly dressed following the first half, but it was not until the final quarter that he entered the fray, and it was then too late for him to alter the result. Bud Williamson, manager of the Hi-Grads wouldn't listen to Rorvig getting into action during the third quarter, but apparently satisfied that his squad had the victory tucked away he paid little attention to Rorvig's entrance during the final quarter.

Keyed to a battling pitch, the Hi-Grads presented a strong, well-balanced squad.

Early in the game Gerlitz punted to Harling who fumbled and Stevens gained possession and ran 20 yards for a touchdown which Sutton converted and the northerners were away to a six point lead.

The second quarter had hardly been underway when Pentland dropped Gerlitz punt behind his own line and Devanay pounced on the ball for a touchdown, which Sutton failed to convert. This made it 11 to 0 for the Hi-Grads. Four sensational plays by Duncan, coupled with an Edmonton offside, gave Jerry Morrison the opportunity to try for a field goal and he hoisted the ball over the cross bar to give Bronks their first three points.

When Ritchie kicked off to start the third quarter Pentland fumbled when tackled and Robertson gained possession for Edmonton. This gave Sutton an opportunity for a field goal and his kick was true to the mark and the count was 14-3.

At this stage of the game Maher and McRae did some fine ball carrying and the first mentioned player kicked into touch in goal for Calgary's fourth point. Shortly after Maher kicked to Gerlitz and at least three local players tackled him for a rouge and Calver had a fifth point.

Pete McRae pulled off the nicest play of the game at this stage when he ran 50 yards through a broken field before Stevens knocked him off balance. It appeared as though he was well away for a touchdown, but Stevens' be a running dive managed to stop him. Bronks had the north-er on the run.

Bronks got into the game starting the first season and had the misfortune to make a fumble when carrying the ball. During the remainder of the game the Hi-Grads took no chances as Gerlitz with the advantage of the wind, counted on every occasion. McRae was prominent again, and just before full time was called Rorvig completed a forward pass for a gain of 20 yards.

It was wide open football, the kind the extreme relish and they all got a kick out of it, even though the home boys were on the short end of the score.

"They weren't a weak link in the Hi-Grads' rugby chain. Gerlitz did some

remarkable punting, while Sutton and Heath pulled off numerous fine runs. Stevens, the quarter, was always prominent. Ritchie, the centre, who towered over all other players on the gridiron, provided one of the greatest exhibitions of secondary defence ever exhibited in this city. The line proved formidable as Calgary's runs were made mostly around the ends.

Pete McRae and Steve Duncan were outstanding for the Bronks. McRae, a former Central and Commercial High star, instilled a lot of pep into the Bronks' attack, as he was the foremost ball carrier in action on the field. Maher held his own with Gerlitz in the punting duel. Morrison, F. Boyle and Christie were also prominent for the locals.

Bronks' greatest weakness was their inability to get their play away fast. They took far too much time in the huddle, especially during the second half when they required all the time necessary to try and make up their deficit.
