

Argos and Tigers Lose To O.R.F.U. Squads

Sarnia Flashes Power While Defeating Scullers 5-1 in Toronto—Balmy Beach Beats Hamilton by 11 to 6.

TORONTO, Sept. 27.—O.—Sarnia Imperials, still a great big team with loads of power and speed, made it unanimous today that the winner of the O.R.F.U. title this Fall will have considerable to say about the Canadian championship. Imperials and Balmy Beach speak with some authority.

In the first exhibition engagement of the Toronto season Saturday, Sarnia defeated Argonauts of the Big Four 5-1 before a crowd of 4,000. This was in line with O.R.F.U. policy as prescribed by the Beasches who scored pre-season wins over two Big Four teams, Montreal Indians and Hamilton Tigers.

Stirling Does Kicking.

Hugh (Bummer) Stirling, not quite as good a punter as he was last year, kicked two singles for Imperials and veteran Alex Hayes drop-kicked a field goal for the other three points. Earl Selkirk, who held his own in a kicking duel with Stirling, booted the only Argo point in the second period.

But Imperials, five-times O.R.F.U. champions and 1934 Canadian champions, outplayed the Scullers from start to finish. A forward pass attack, with Rocky Paszasa and Stirling on the firing line, was Sarnia's most effective weapon for the offence. But there was nothing much wrong with the running attack.

Coulter Tosses Passes.

Coulter, all-eastern quarterback of last season, engineered the only threatening Toronto drive in the final period. He threw a 20-yard forward pass to Len Staughton and another on the next play to Connely. For the only time in the game, it seemed possible Imperials might be beaten.

But Coulter tossed one pass too many. It was intercepted by Paszasa who sprinted 50 yards down the touchline. Imperials just missed scoring an additional point before the final whistle. McWaters' kick going into touch a yard from the goal line.

Tigers Are Beaten.

HAMILTON, Ont., Sept. 27.—O.—Hamilton Tigers bowed to the disappointing Balmy Beach team in a pre-season football game here Saturday, finishing on the wrong end of an 11-6 count before a crowd of more than 4,000 fans. With Ab Box at the helm, the Toronto team performed well, and showed enough class to convince local grid fans they will be a hard team to topple in any competition this season.

Tigers performed like a mystery team. At times they looked smart enough to push Beasches back with a series of end runs and forward passes, while at other stages of the game they appeared like a squad that was trying to keep their best display under cover. Scidons did they toss their heavy artillery against the invaders, steering con-

tent to let the back division do all the offensive work.

Fine Aerial Duel.

After a scoreless first quarter in which the fans witnessed one of the finest aerial duels ever staged here with Box and Welch as opponents, the Bengals opened the score with a lofty hoist from the toe of Welch.

Beasches came right back with offensive power that saw them carry the ball close to the Tiger line from where Box booted over for the equalizer. Before the half-time whistle, Reynolds kicked a field goal to put the visitors on the long end of a 4-1 count.

With the opening of the third quarter Tigers began to open up, but the sensational booting of Box, with some fine passing and receiving, enabled the Beasches to keep Tigers out of the score column until Simpson broke through the line to block a kick which Wilson fell on for a try and Tigers went to the front 6-4.

Beasches collected two singles to knot the count and with only two minutes left to play, Jack Taylor, after making a nice catch of a high hoist, lost the ball as he started on his way. Hennessey scooped it up and rolled four yards over Tiger line for an unconverted try to end the scoring.
