

Gridders Wind Up Season

North Shore Wins Another;
Smith Scores
Twice

Big Four Canadian football season, a very successful one both for crowds and quality of play, according to President Sax Crossley, finished Saturday with probably the worst game of the year, yet one that had enough thrills in it to keep the many people from thinking about their Christmas shopping.

The sure fingers of Garney Smith that reached up into the air and pulled down a long forward pass from his pal Bullock led North Shore, the champions to a win over the luckless Knights of Columbus by a score of 14-6.

Bullock let his toss go from the 18-yard line to the five, led Smith nicely and the latter made a fine catch then galloped over unmolested. At the time they were trailing 6-5 to Knights who had scored when Downie on two plays went over. The champions had scored first when Garney Smith intercepted a forward pass and ran 65 yards for a touchdown, making it four touchdowns in two games that he has tallied.

At the end of the game Jack Taylor booted a place kick for three points and that is the game as far as scoring is concerned.

It was a ragged contest of fumbles by the carload, especially at crucial times. North Shore started off with a Modin march up the field then they lost possession on the 20-yard line with a fumble. Knights started to march right back and similarly they butter-fingered the ball away.

By the same token Knights were on the three-yard line once and fumbled again, losing the ball. The line play was good and hard, the tackling good and Taylor did some nice kicking. Bert Downey and Ed Kendall made nice gains for Knights but it was just a case of which fumble would count the most.

Smith was allowed to intercept his pass because the Columbus end was not watching the play and if he'd turned would have had a cinch completion from Downie, but he forgot to look.

ONSIDE KICK WORKS

Knights got in position for their score with an onside kick, the first one of the season. Then Downie went over. Incidentally he played one of the best games of his career. Kendall made the convert.

Just as Knights were feeling they might win one Bullock and Smith pulled off the long pass the loers having fumbled on the 20-yard line.

The last of the game Knights made many aerial bids to get away to score but they suffered a 25-yard rough play penalty and it put North Shore in position for the place kick.

At halftime there was a kicking and passing exhibition with Jack Taylor of North Shore winning the former about 55 yards and Boland getting the longest heave.
