

Bombers Near Stevenson's Pass Pitching Sets Pace; Lou Mogul Stars

CALGARY, Nov. 4.—There is no sign of a new order in Western football, with Winnipeg Bombers facing re-election as premier senior team on the plains.

The national champions returned to Winnipeg today with a one-game lead in the Prairie championship series, pointing for a straight-games conquest of Calgary Bronks.

On the cold, greasy surface of Memorial stadium here Saturday, Bombers exploited both barrels of the West's most colorful offensive, subduing the Bronks 7-0 in the first game of a best-in-three games final.

With two swift, starting drives of forward passing brilliant, they thrust 80 yards in the second quarter for game-winning touchdowns, scored by half-back running Arthur Stevenson. In the second half they buttressed the advantage with average line play and a punishing ground attack that produced another point before the game ended.

Bombers were held scoreless as Bronks recorded their sixth consecutive win of the season and approached their fourth Western championship in a row. Not one did they allow within reasonable range of the Winnipeg goal line and only at scattered intervals did they establish attack in the back field.

The trip was short for victory over the short route and led to a decision over the Bronks will give them their fourth Western championship and a berth in the national final.

During the week end, Western league officials expressed further hope with the proposal of the Toronto Sports Review magazine to host a "football" match between the official champion of the Western championship and the Eastern champion to accept an Eastern bid.

Follow Directions

In the first game of the Western championship series, Winnipeg opening to meet Bronks with the pre-arranged plan of Coach Ray Threlkeld, "leave it to the coach" after striking up a second quarter lead.

For a crowd of 10,000 football fans after Pat O'Brien, it was not an exciting contest, but Winnipeg operators expressed appreciation for the wealth of hard, technical ground football in exchange along the sidelines.

Bombers gave the game to the two most notable high points when they drove quickly and expertly to the victory in the second quarter.

Repeated during every one of their early moves along a soft, green gridiron, Pat Hault, 35, the team's center, was the key player in the attack.

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Minnesota Rules On U.S. Gridirons
