

# TORONTO INDIANS TIE WILDCATS, 6-6

**Hamilton Team With O.R.  
F.U. Title Already Clinched  
Lucky to Escape Defeat**

Hamilton, Ont., November 2. —  
Ⓢ — A single point by Norm Dyce in the dying minutes of the game gave Toronto Indians a 6-6 tie with Hamilton Wildcats, undefeated leaders in the Ontario Rugby Football Union race, in Hamilton's last scheduled home game of the season Saturday.

The game-tying point which was a touch-in-goal came after a bad snap on Hamilton's 40 lost Wildcats possession of the ball. The visiting Indians then lost 10 yards on two bad snaps themselves but on the third down Dyce was still close enough to kick a single.

At that Wildcats appeared lucky to escape with a division of the points as they fumbled badly throughout and trailed through most of the second, third and fourth quarters. They were hard-pressed throughout by a strong Toronto line which continually ripped large holes in the opposing front rank. Wildcats were kept in the game only through Al Lenard's running and George Slinn's kicking. Slinn had four kicks blocked and was hustled on most of the others.

The game, played on an extremely wet and muddy field, meant nothing to Wildcats, who already had clinched the championship while the Toronto team already had made sure of second place.

First point of the game came when Hardy Awrey kicked a touch-in-goal for Hamilton after which Slinn kicked a lone one to Macklem who was forced out behind his line. That made it 2-0 for the home team but from then on they were hard-pressed to hold off the charging Toronto team.

In the second quarter one of Slinn's kicks was blocked on Hamilton's 25-yard line from where five Toronto players took turns at dribbling it over the line where Slinn fell on it for a touchdown. Before the half, Hamilton got one back on Slinn's kick to Barber who was rouged.

Barber was rouged on another of Slinn's kicks in the third quarter to leave the score at 5-4 for Toronto
