

Ottawans Stage Story-Book Finish To Eliminate Argos

George Fraser Boots Two Long Placements and Rough Riders Perform Sensationally Behind Charging Winglines to Trim Scullers, I.O.I. and Take "Big Four" Title Round, 18-17, Point on Last Play Wins

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 16.—A gallant Ottawa football team, never wavered in the face of the most discouraging setbacks, thundered past Toronto Argonauts in a roaring finish at Varsity Stadium Saturday afternoon to retain "Big Four" honors for the third consecutive year.

As a charging, ferocious Ottawa wing-line set the Scullers back on their heels with a smashing display, Ross Timmer's fighting force secured the first championship of the new Eastern Rugby Football Union in a battle that must take its place alongside the Scarra-Ottawa playoff of 1936 as one of the most dramatic in Canadian gridiron history.

Reigning 16-8 in the playoff opener at Ottawa the previous week, the Rough Riders made the game with a 10-1 victory before an estimated crowd of 20,000 fans to capture the round and title 18-17. But neither the game score nor the count on the round tell the true story—the story of an Ottawa team which put a three-point deficit with two minutes to go or the story of the winning point on the final play of the series, as the Riders qualified to meet Hamilton Wildcats in the Eastern Canada final.
