Ottawa Trounces Indians 21-0 But Pass From Playoff Picture

With an eye on the scoreboard, Ottawa Trojans closed their end of the schedule by shellacking Toronto Indians 21-0 at Lansdowne Park, Saturday afternoon before a meagre crowd of less than a thousand fans and saw their hopes of a playoff berth in the O.R.F.U. shattered when the final count at Toronto was posted with Balmy Beach on the long end.

In collecting their second victory of the season, Trojans had an easy time of it, scoring a converted touchdown in the first quarter, a placement in the second canto, and two more converted tries in the third and fourth periods.

Indians Weak Team.

Indians showed little offensively and defensively from the snap out. They failed to threaten once during the entire game. At one time in the third quarter, they reached Ottawa's 3-yard stripe, but Callow's placement attempt was weak and Emile Dagenais took the rolling ball on the goal-line to give Trojans possession.

Ottawa got their first major score midway through the opening period when Gerry Lefebvre recovered Craibbe's fumble on the Indians' five. Arnie McWatters went through for three yards on first down, and Tommy Daley crossed the goal-line on the next play. George Fraser converted to make it 6-0.

Trojans picked up three more points in the second period. Ted Edwards tossed a pass to McWatters who went to the Indians' 35. An extension, Daley to Dagenais brought the ball to the 20. A line play gained no yards and Fraser picked up three more points with a 22-yard placement to boost Ottawa's total to 9-0.

Wilf Hutt broke through to block a Toronto kick on the Indians' 30 in the third quarter, and Al Leach dribbled the ball to the 26 before falling on it. McWatters skirted the left end and ran for 27 yards for a touch on the first play, and Fraser converted to make it 15-0.

Ottawa's third major score came as a result of another blocked kick in the final period with Fraser breaking through to smother the play on the Toronto 10. Jack Mowatt picked up the loose ball and ran for a try. Fraser made it four for four with his third convert of the day to complete the scoring.
