

# Navy, Camp Borden, Ottawa Win Their League Football Sessions

LONDON, Ont., Oct. 23.—Bulldogs, the Toronto Navy football team, put on the pressure in the last quarter of the game against St. Thomas R.C.A.F. Technical Training School Hornets on Saturday to come from behind and score a 14-5 win. The triumph for the Tars left them in top slot of the Ontario Armed Services Football League.

## MULLIN VS. STUKUS

Paced by Ray (Moon) Mullins, Hornets took an early lead and held on for three-quarters of the game. But consistent scoring by L.S. Annis Stukus kept the Tars not far behind and his field goal after the start of the fourth stanza—his second of the game—put the Sailors ahead for the first time.

Hornet's line, led by Cpl. Joe Louis, turned in a neat effort in the first half of the game, but found the going tough in the last half. Behind Hornet's line, Mullins accounted for two points in the opening period. His deadline kick was followed with another angle when L.S. Tom Waldon was rouged. Again the Mullins boot added points in the second quarter with a perfect field goal from 25 yards out.

HAMILTON, Oct. 23.—The R.C.A.F. Bombers from Camp Borden are still in the running in the Ontario Armed Services Football League today, thanks to the work of LAC. Bobbie Porter. Porter accounted for all of the Borden points as the Bombers came back in the final three quarters on Saturday to tie Hagersville R.C.A.F., 6-6.

After the Hagersville Flyers went to work in the first stanza with a converted major, the Bombers fought an uphill battle, adding point by point. LAC. Reg.
