

Beaches' 17-to-5 Victory Eliminates Local Club

League Executive Spurns Windsor Charge Against U.S. Player

A 17-5 defeat Saturday by Balmy Beach and another kind of setback at Hamilton yesterday from the O.R.F.U. executive leaves the Windsor Rockets in fifth place and out of the senior football campaign for 1946.

AS SCHEDULED

Play-offs in the Ontario Rugby Football Union will proceed as scheduled after a protest by Windsor Rockets was disallowed. The Windsor protest was against use of an American player by Toronto Balmy Beach in a game against the Rockets at Toronto, Oct. 11.

The O.R.F.U. executive turned down the Windsor protest when the Rockets were unable to file proof of their charge that Bill Vogt, the player in question, was not eligible under the residence rule. Windsor's delegation at the meeting asked extension of time to produce the required proof but this suggestion was defeated.

NEEDED RECOGNITION

A favorable decision on the protest was needed by the Rockets if they were to gain a fourth place deadlock with Sarnia Imperials. Both teams lost their final games Saturday afternoon, Toronto Indians beating the Imperials, 27-16, in Sarnia while the Beaches defeated Rockets, 17-5, before some 3,000 fans at Jackson Park here.

The twin defeats left Sarnia with eight points in the standings, two better than the Rockets who have six. For the first quarter of Saturday's game here it looked like the Rockets might have a chance of beating the big, bruising Beach squad on the field. On the strength of Gerry Dawson's field goal, Windsor led Toronto, 3-1. The Beaches scored their one point when Dawson was rouged on Johnny Lake's kick.

FOOLISH LATERAL

Early in the second quarter, the ex-Winnipeg Blue Bomber booted from the centre stripe to Dawson, who ran the ball to about 20 yards in front of the Windsor goal-line. Then he foolishly tried to lateral to Joe Scialowski. Halfback Norm Millen leaped into the air, snagged the ball and ran across the goal-line, dragged down by Scialowski just after he crossed the stripe.

The Windsor line, playing a great game despite the fact that the heavy mud aided the bigger Beach line, blocked Lake's attempt to convert.

CAMIE'S BOOTS ONE

Len Camie booted to the deadline near the end of the half to bring the Rockets within two points of the Beach squad which led, at the half, 4-4.

After an exchange of kicks which opened the third quarter, Balmy Beach gained control on the Windsor 20, through a Bobby Porter to McComiskey pass.

Big Jack Cunningham went around left end on a reverse to score the touchdown which Lake converted.

Windsor started rolling with some nice line plays and forwards but another pass interception proved the Rockets' downfall. Cunningham grabbed Frank DeMarco's forward and raced 50 yards over the Windsor goal-line for another touchdown. Lake's convert was no good.

GHETTI VS. MEEN

In the fourth quarter, rough play which had been breaking out sporadically all afternoon turned into fighting with Fiero Ghetty and Jack Meen, of Toronto, finally banished from the game after a general rough-house on the field.

An irate fan, more foolhardy than sensible, tried to take a poke at Meen on the Beach bench and created quite a disturbance before the Windsor police were able to halt the commotion. Late in the quarter, a Balmy Beach fumble deep in their own territory was booted over the line by Bob McMillan. Ford grabbed the ball and booted it into touch for a rouge. Ghetty was awarded the John W. Komak trophy at halftime as the Windsor team's most valuable player

during the year. Mike Komak made the presentation.
