

## First Point in Two Seasons For Ottawa ORFU Team

TORONTO, Sept. 7.—The re-built, 1947 edition of Ottawa Trojans, earned their first point in two seasons in the Senior ORFU records Saturday when they battled to a 6-6 tie with Toronto Indians in their season debut before an estimated 4,000 shirt-sleeved fans at Oakwood Stadium. The 1946 ORFU champion Indian team fought uphill all the way to tie the game in the dying minutes of play.

**Farley Scores Touch.**

With temperatures hovering in the high 80's and dust clouding every play, Trojans passed up several scoring opportunities by weak kicks and untimely fumbles. In the early minutes of the second quarter, Wally Masters' squad capitalized on the at times porous Indian line, with Jim McPaul barging through to block Crowe's attempted punt on his own three yard stripe. Joe Farley, playing outside, and one of five American imports bolstering the Ottawa force, followed McPaul and charged after the bounding ball to gather it in behind the line for a major score. George Gilmour, with the up-rights for the extra point.

The Redskins started a last quarter march from centre field, led by their brilliant American half, Bob Patfrath.

Slipping through the line for seven and eight yards on every play, and a deadly aerial attack brought Bob Cosgrove's tribe to the Trojan 20, and only a brilliant jumping interception of Patfrath's pass by Ted MacLarty saved off a touchdown. Trojans were stopped cold on two plunges, and Bill Petrilas, brought in from United States, booted from behind his goal line to his own 40 yard stripe. Again the tribe displayed their ground-gaining attack.

**Lloyd Butt Hurt.**

Nilo Clott dropped a flat pass through centre to Patfrath for seven yards. Lloyd Butt, Ottawa snap, being laid out on the play with a knee in the stomach, was carried from the field. Crowe gained eight yards on a drive through left side to advance to the Ottawa 25. Curly Moynahan batted down a Clott pass intended for Booker to break up the next play. Then came the damage.

Clott faded back, and arched a short one to Patfrath, who easily eluded the centre secondary and started for the goal from Trojan's 20.

On the 10 it looked like the play was stopped when three potential Ottawa tacklers swarmed in. Two of them got a piece of Patfrath and the other bounced off, the Indian star driving between them to stagger across the line with but four minutes of play left. Gerry Smith, a diminutive colored boy from Toronto's high school ranks, converted to tie the score, 6-6.

The evident absence of an effective Trojan offensive can be laid at the feet of poor timing and the unfamiliarity of the T formation to the players. Plungers were consistently crawling up the backs of their interference, and pass receivers were just crossing the line of scrimmage or were far out of range. Of 13 Trojan passes attempted, most of them by Masters, two were intercepted and one was completed, and that from Masters to Farley in the final quarter for 17 yards. Of 16 attempts through the air by the host club, six were made good.

**Trojans Should Improve.**

However, a few more hard practices to sharpen their timing and with one or two games in the books, Trojans should be a contending team in the ORFU.

In the opening quarter, their air route already showing lack of polish, Masters elected to drive on the ground. An exchange of kicks put Ottawa in midfield, and Bill Petrilas, who lifted some lousy punts, one of them 70 yards, booted the plugkin to the Indian 10. Gerry Smith hit through the line for eight yards and fumbled. Moynahan pouncing on the ball on the Indian 22. Al Smith found a hole through Toronto's front wall for five yards, was hit hard and lost the ball. Farmer recovering to end the threat.

**MacLarty, Gilmour Star.**

MacLarty and Gilmour, graduates of Ottawa high school teams, were the bright lights in Trojan's lineup. On two occasions, Gilmour grounded Indian passes, both times with the receiver in the open. MacLarty displayed more speed than anything on the field, finding holes and curving around the ends. Jim McPaul played a charging game on the

line, blocking two kicks, one for the touchdown.

Patfrath, Clott and Fowler carried the Toronto load, carrying the ball out from behind their line twice in the opening session.
