### Sarnia Golden Bears Win O.R.F.U. Opener

SARNIA—Sparked by the brilliant running of import halfback Chuck Stanley, Sarnia Golden Bears opened the 1959 Senior O.R.F.U. season here Saturday night with a narrow 20-19 victory over London Lords.

Despite threatening weather, more than 4,500 fans jammed into Norman Perry Memorial Park to witness the league opener which was marred with first half rough house play that saw four players ejected for fist throwing, including Sarnia's import quarterback, Hal Ledyard.

Ledyard, formerly with the Ottawa Rough Riders was given the thumb by referee Harry Hills, of Kitchener along with three Lords. The three Lords were tackled Whitty Young, import Bob Sedlack and end Bob Harris.

The defending champion Bears, displaying a potent running attack, were paced by Stanley, a second year import from South Carolina State, with three touchdowns, all along the ground.

Sharing the spotlight with Stanley was homebrew quarterback George Culley, who took over the pivot duties from Ledyard in the second quarter. Culley, still of junior age and sparkplug of the Junior O.R.F.U. Sarnia Knights last year, handled the club like a veteran after Ledyard was ejected.

Early in the first quarter after London worked to the Sarnia eight following an interception of a Ledyard pass, the Bears took over and drove 103 yards on 11 plays for their first touchdown.

The stage for the Bears first major was set when pass interference was called on Sarnia import end, Harry Mackey, on the London 15. Former Montreal Alouette fullback John Cronin carried to the six from where Stanley slashed over. Tex Robinson converted.

London took to the air early in the second quarter and on third down from the Sarnia 22, former Texas A&L quarterback Jerry Tompkins hit playing coach Al Bruno in the end zone for the major. Ted Koska converted to tie the score.

A combination of London roughing penalties and the running of Stanley, import half Joe Reeves and playing coach Fran Rogel later moved the Bears on the Lords 15. On third down Ledyard carried to the one from where Stanley hurtled over. The convert by Robinson was wide.

Sarnia increased their lead to 19-7 early in the third quarter when Stanley, behind some excellent blocking, zig-zagged his way 29 yards to pay dirt. Once again Robinson was wide on his convert.

The Bears added to their lead when Culley's 45-yard punt went for a single point in the end zone. Tom Timbreil was rouged on the kick.

With Tompkins taking to the air, the Lords scored a third quarter unconverted touchdown when import fullback Ron King bulldozed over from the two-yard line. The major was set up by a 50-yard pass and run play from Tompkins to import end Jim Greer.

The Lords continued to press in the fourth quarter and halfback Don Beattie took a pitchout and went around end for a major from the four. The convert attempt by Koska, which would have tied the score, was blocked by a charging Sarnia line.

London picked up 38 first downs compared to the Bears' 34. They gained 452 yards through the air to Sarnia's 71. On the ground the Bears picked up 274 to the Lords 71.

### Copeland Sparks K-W O.R.F.U. Win

WATERLOO, (CP)—The revamped Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen won an impressive 42-0 victory over Detroit Raiders Saturday night to open the Senior Ontario Rugby Football Union schedule.

Dutchmen showed power in every department with a six-touchdown display under varying conditions. In the first half, on a sunbaked field they ran up a 28-0 lead. At half time a torrential downpour which continued through the second half, provided muddy going for the last 30 minutes.

Import Terry Myer scored three touchdowns. Homebrews halfback Jim Copeland, a Windsor boy, got a pair and import Alvin Jackson bagged the sixth. Mike Norcia converted all six.

Despite the score the Raiders put up a much better showing than they did here a year ago in losing 39-7. They flashed second-half power from scrimmage and uncorked a fair passing arm with Frank Finney throwing to Jim Hinesley for regular gains.

Dutchies' Myer ran for the first touchdown after a Raider fumble.

A poor Detroit punt, gave them another opening and they drove 51 yards in four plays with Jackson running 19 for the major.

In the second quarter Pat Rupert intercepted a Raider pass at the Detroit 31 and Dutchies counted again when Myer took a pass from Bob Cieri in the end zone.

The last touchdown of the half was a 46 yard drive with Myer counting on a 20-yard toss.

Raiders made their best showing in rain during the third quarter. They drove 66 yards in one march and lost the ball by inches.

In the final frame, a 93-yard pass and run effort set up a touchdown by Copeland. Then Copeland scored again on a 49-yard dash.

Dutchies had an 18-14 edge in first downs. They gained 192 yards passing to 104 for Detroit, and 200 rushing to Raiders' 106. Five intercepted passes hurt Detroit.
